Brazil has now 6000 miles of railroad in operation, and several thousand more in course of construction or planned. Great rivers favorable to navigation traverse the best parts of the continent, so that the facilities for communication are even better than the railroads constructed would indicate.

In these days of rigid economy every particle of material must be made to "count," and there is very little of anything allowed to go to waste. The hair which is taken from the hides at a tannery has found a new use. Formerly this hair was of little value and was practically worthless. By a new process it is taken from the hide by a machine which at the same time cleanses it, and is then baled and sent to the factory, where it is utilized in making cloth "all wool" and a yard wide.

McKinley, as Governor Campbell showed in his recent speech, is attempting to draw attention from the tariff to the silver question, and it is intimated Sherman would like to have something attract the people away from the silver discussion. Each of these great republican statesmen have begun to realize that the ground upon which they stand is a little shaky, and are anxious for better footing. That McKinley would be willing to stand or fall by the tariff issue was confidently asserted by the full chorus of republican organs. It looks now as if they would have to change their tune. It makes a big difference in the boldness of a man's assertions when he thinks there is nobody to pick his statements to pieces; but when one of equal ability, aided by the right side of the question, faces him on the stump, it has a very moderating effect upon his wild utterances. From now until after the election hot political shot will fly in all directions, and Campbell's chances for coming out on top are encouraging.—Portland Dispatch.
