GOOD EVENING

FREE DELIVERY.—Albany should have a free delivery. In towns under 10,000 where it has been tried it has been a great success. An Eastern city, says Postmaster-General W. Amos, is greatly pleased with the success of the free-delivery system in the small towns in which it has been introduced. The experiment shows that the extra cost is almost met by the increased revenue. Naturally the erroneous reports to the effect that the trial was a sad failure came unheeded. The extension of free delivery is a practical matter of the highest value to the people of the country, and it is hoped that these experiments may be the prelude to a universal free delivery system such as the people of England enjoy. The one tried at Roseburg has met with popular favor there.

SEWER WORK.—Work on the Maple street sewer has been progressing with forty-eight men at work. Considerable rock has been struck and there has been an inconvenience from water. The sewer near the mouth is twenty-five feet deep. This forenoon part of the men were transferred to Ferry street where work was begun. More men will be employed as fast as possible. Bays, Jeffries & Co. are rushing. Hayne & Buck are pushing the Madison street sewer with ten or twelve men. Owing to the fine soil and dry ground they are able to make very rapid work and are doing a good job.

THE TOURNAMENT.—Though not winning any first prize the Albany team made a good record at Victoria, winning next the most money, \$815, the most won by any other team being \$1150. Albany won the second prize in every contest run but the championship, and would in that but for the water being turned on too quickly. In that race Nanaimo won first money in the slow time of 1:33 5-10; Astoria, 1:29 3-10; Westminster, 1:24 5-10. In the consolation race, wet test, Westminster got a record of 42 1-2; Albany, 43; Seattle, 47. Albany won second prize in the make and break contest, \$15.

A HOUSE BURNED.—Last night while sitting at their supper table, about 7 o'clock, the family of S. P. Williamson, residing in the Townsend addition, discovered the ceiling of the room in flames. With their neighbors an effort was made to save the building, but without success. All of the furniture though, was gotten out. The house belonged to J. H. Townsend and was valued at \$500. It was not insured. A hot house only twelve feet away was saved by hard work.

A BOY LOST.—Here is a very characteristic item from the Drain Echo about a boy being lost: Considerable excitement has been caused in this place Monday, by the rumor that a boy had been lost. After much excitement and search by many citizens for the lost boy, he was discovered hidden among the large invoice of new boots and shoes just placed in stock by Drain & Co. When found, the little fellow had very nearly cried his eyes out for a new pair of school shoes.

THE USUAL EXPERIENCE.—The following will be of interest to ambitious young base ball chides: The La Grande team has at last disbanded, after waiting a year for a game with Pendleton. The players will scatter to the four winds, and wait for next season to bring employment. The La Grande club gave their role for 1901 to the bank 3 days afterwards to pay the players, and yet La Grande promises to have a club next year.

LARGE RECEIPTS.—The cash footings of receipts of the Southern Pacific railroad for the month of September are \$12,187.87. These are the heaviest monthly receipts ever taken in by the line.—Guard. A good record for a place Eugene. Albany's best record is nearly 50 per cent more.
