DIED.

TURNER.—At his residence six miles south west of this city, on Saturday morning Oct. 1st, at 2 o'clock, Ephraim Turner, 65 years of age, born in Howard county, Missouri, August 17th 1839 and there were 70 years 1 month and 15 days old. He moved to Oregon in 1866 and settled on the farm where he died and has resided there ever since. He was a hard working, honest citizen and leaves a large family of seven sons and daughters to mourn his loss.

The funeral service will be preached tomorrow morning at the residence at 9:30 o'clock, after which the remains will be brought to this city and buried in the Masonic cemetery at 12:30 o'clock.

BYNUM'S SPEECH.

A very large and appreciative audience gathered at the Opera House last evening to hear Congressman Bynum, of Indianapolis, discuss political issues. Many ladies were present and numerous republicans also. Mr. Bynum is a pleasant speaker, and he speaks with great force and effect. He started out with a very complimentary reference to Oregon by saying that heretofore he has said that he lived in the West, but since coming to the Pacific Coast he sees his mistake and now says he lives in the East. He said the tariff question is the one great issue affecting the interests of all. The republican party has changed its course on the tariff question. In 1876 it declared for tariff reform, but in 1888 it veered around and declared for protection or practical prohibition of imports. In 1890 that party elected a president who was a member of the Golden Club and who declared that he was in favor of that kind of protection that leads to free trade. Mr. Bynum illustrated the difference between paying a direct tax as a city or county tax and an indirect or tariff tax by saying that when men pay their city or county taxes most all grumble and complain when they have to pay from \$1.50 to \$3.00 on the hundred, whereas every man or woman who buys imported dutiable goods pays an average of \$60 on the \$100 worth. This tax he pays without knowing how much he pays. He made forcible illustrations of the fallacy of the home market scheme as urged by McKinley, by showing that when a man manufactured products in this country, shipped them to Australia, exchanged them for wool, shipped the wool back to this country, that man is just as much a producer of wool as the man who herds his sheep on government lands free. He showed that a large majority of the labor people of the United States are engaged in non-protected occupations and that wages in these occupations are higher than in the protected industries. He showed that skilled laborers in this country, in consequence of the greater amount of products turned out per day, actually receive less wages than those of England. This was proved by the fact that the value of the product of the American laborer in 1890 was \$1980, while that of the English laborer was only \$857. He showed that notwithstanding the cry has always been that protection secured good wages, yet protected manufacturers, immediately after the passage of the McKinley bill, began to reduce wages and this at all times and circumstances will be the case when the supply of labor is greater than the demand.

The speaker was closely followed by all his auditors, and when he declared that he was not here to abuse republicans, believing that the mass of republicans were neither less nor more honest than democrats, but he was here feeling that every republican was as much interested in the question as he, and that he sought to induce them to think and reason only, his remarks made a deep impression on his hearers. It is safe to say that much good seed was sown and that some of it fell upon good ground.
