ATTEMPTED ABDUCTION.—A few months ago an account was given of how one Harris, who had separated from his wife, a step daughter of W S John, de camped with the only child of the family and fled to Scio precinct, and also how a few weeks after Mrs. Harris succeeded in getting hold of the little child while Harris was in the city attending the circus Saturday night. Harris, assisted by two men, made an attempt to again get the child. Mrs. Harris was working at Mr. P. A. Burkhardt's. The men went there for the purpose. The police got wind of the proceedings and appeared at the right time. They found the two men leaving that part of the city and captured Harris hiding in the basement of Mr. Burkhardt's house. Harris was given twenty-four hours in which to leave the city, and he left.

A GOOD REASON.—The Eugene Guard gets down to business as follows: "The reason Salem is so often misused is that such a large proportion of the population is confined in the popular resorts known as the penitentiary and asylum, and unkind keepers will not allow them to attend public meetings.
