

ITS MISSION.

The mission of the distinguished democratic leaders to the northwest was definitely set forth by C F Black to a Telegram reporter as follows:

"Our mission here," said Mr Black, "undertaken upon the invitation of the democracy of the northwest, is mainly to advise with our friends respecting a more efficient organization of the party, which shall be general and uniform throughout the union. We represent the National Association of Democratic Clubs, and for this particular purpose, the national committee, Mr Brice's circular letter to the chairmen of state committees, and also the one to the national committee men, advising them that the campaign of 1892 will be principally a contest of clubs, explains sufficiently to every regular party man the object we have in view."

"The national committee proposes the institution of a system of democratic societies—distinguished from all other clubs, in name, structure and principle—like those of New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Washington and Montana, as nearly uniform in all the states as may be. They will be the fighting contingent, the tremendous practical auxiliary of the managing organization of the party, and an integral part of it. The democratic society was the first organization of the party. The societies elected Jefferson and seated him."

"That alone implies orthodoxy and regularity. They are the open parlaments of the people in every neighborhood. There is no test of membership except faith in the pure republican principles of Jefferson. Every man who believes in the rule of the people, in lighter taxes, diminished expenditures, simplicity and frugality, and the equality of all men and all classes, in justice to all and special favors to none, will find his proper political home in the democratic society of his neighborhood."

"They afford an inviting field for the patriotic ambition of the young men, who, in the debates of the primary societies and in the representative assemblies, have opportunities afforded by no other system. The annual general assembly of the democratic societies of Pennsylvania, held at Pittsburg on the 30th ult., was composed of 1632 regularly-appointed deputies. The second annual general assembly of the state of Washington was a splendid body of men. With us in Pennsylvania these annual general assemblies of the democratic societies, embracing the flower of the active democracy, are grand ratification meetings, at which the state campaign is inaugurated. They occur in virtue of the constitution of the democratic society of the state, often the regular nominating convention."

"I hope to hear, at an early day, of the organization of the democratic society of Oregon, embracing at least one society in every county. Oregon should be democratic. You have not only the votes, but every incentive to make it so. But you don't poll your vote, and you probably will not until you have this system of organization and agitation reaching down into every precinct. That done, all factions and personal differences will disappear in the fervor of fresh endeavor and new hope, and you will place your state where she rightfully belongs—on the democratic side."
