

GOV. CAMPBELL'S CHALLENGE.

Gov. Campbell is making a magnificent fight. Whether he shall be re-elected or not, he has shown himself to be the most courageous democratic leader and the best stump-speaker in the west.

Speaking at the centre of the glass and pottery industries, and again in the mining iron region, to great crowds of so-called "protected" workmen, Gov. Considerable talk was indulged in by different members in explanation of the workings of the Linn county business council.

Dinner being announced at this point the worthy president declared a recess for that purpose, of which all partook of heartily, interspersed with a good social chat, all taking a general part.

Immediately after lunch, headed by Profs French and Letcher, the council as a body started for the Agricultural college. On arriving at the college all were shown through the different rooms, and the manner of conducting said institution throughout.

The greenhouse was gone through, also the dormitory, barn, silo building, etc, and their different uses was explained in a hurried manner. As there were a good many persons in attendance who had never been at the college there was quite an interest taken by the visitors in examining the buildings, stock, flowers, etc., and none will regret the time spent. My only complaint was that our time was too short to make any thing like a thorough examination.

After two hours thus spent, we returned to the council hall and resumed business. The next meeting of the council will be held with Grand Prairie Grange, No 10, Linn county, on the first Saturday in Nov., 1891.

A vote of thanks was tendered by the council to Corvallis grange for the use of their hall; to the sisters for the repast furnished, and to the Profs of the college for the interest shown the council.

All seemed to have enjoyed themselves in the day's work done. No other business of importance coming before the council, on motion adjourned.
