This afternoon was devoted to organization and missionary work. The attendance is large and the meetings are full of interest. Tonight there will be an address on "Woman's Work," by Alice Voss; "Retrospect and Prospect," by Rev Brownson, and Home Missions as seen by a new man, Rev Gliman Parker.

The holy coat lake is being confined at Treves. As over 2,000,000 people have visited the city to see it the size of the lake becomes apparent. It is doubtful if many who go to Treves really believe the coat is genuine.

The ecumenical conference of the M. E. church being held at Washington, is attracting considerable attention. Some very pointed remarks are being made, and occasionally a brother gets a pretty live rap. It promises to have a good effect generally.

The democrats at Indianapolis (Harrison's home) gained a sweeping victory at the city election on Tuesday, electing their whole ticket by majorities ranging from 1500 to 3000. This is the second time in twenty-five years that they have carried the city.

The press is calling attention to a generally violated Oregon law, which provides: "It shall be unlawful to sell, barter, trade, give, or in any manner furnish to any minor, tobacco, cigars, or cigarettes in any form or any compound in which tobacco forms a component part."

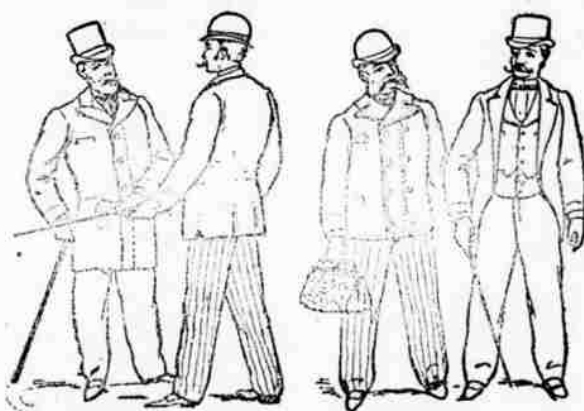
In giving city improvements it seems impossible for a newspaper to halt tell the truth. If the assessor was to follow in its footsteps the builders of new blocks and residences would be bankrupted in six months. The bids for a new brick are published and in a few months, the paper-thinking people have no memories publish the value in a long list more than doubling it. A Salem paper in giving a new list of improvements puts down the S. P. R. R. for \$20,000 for new switches, the Willamette Valley Milling Co. for \$30,000 for water power, machinery, etc., \$12,000 for a church that cost less than \$5,000, the Water Co. for \$20,000 for improvements of about a third the value, new bricks at \$20,000 that cost about half according to the bids, etc. These are simply an example of the way nearly all cities do it.

It will take mints of money just to prepare the exposition grounds for the World's fair to say nothing of the \$7,000,000 to be spent on the great buildings. Here are some of the interesting figures: Grading and filling, \$450,000; landscape gardening, \$323,500; viaducts and bridges, \$125,000; piers, \$70,000; waterway improvements, \$225,000; railways, \$500,000; steam plant, \$800,000; electric lighting, \$1,500,000; statuary, \$100,000; vases, lamps, etc., \$50,000; lake front adornment, \$200,000; water supply and sewerage, \$600,000; other expenses, \$2,000,000; total \$5,943,500. Besides these the total expenses of organization, admiration and operation of the exposition is estimated at nearly \$5,000,000. This takes no account of the sums to be spent by the government, the states or foreign nations, without which we have a grand total of over \$10,000,000. Where will will the money come from?
