Secretary Blaine has never recovered from the shock of his son Walker's death, but his pride now centres in his eldest son.

IS IT UNCONSTITUTIONAL?

There are three cases before the Supreme Court of the United States involving the constitutionality of the McKinley tariff law. Two raise the question on the ground that the senate enrolling clerk omitted the clause pertaining to tobacco. If we mistake not the power of congress to pass a law to tax one individual to assist in making the business of another individual a success is called in question on the sugar bounty question. The memorable words of Justice Miller in a Kansas case will be very pertinent here and to the point. In that decision he very forcibly lay down the doctrine that "to lay with one hand the power of the government on the property of the citizen and with the other to bestow it upon favored individuals to aid private enterprises and build up private fortunes, is none the less a robbery because it is done under the form of the law called taxation." These are strong words but they are the only ones which an upright judge, having in view the solemnity of his oath to support the constitution of his country, could use to express his detestation of the idea of taxing one class for the benefit of another. The most hopeful feature of the matter is that Justice Miller is a very ardent republican.
