A WANDERING HOTEL MAN.—A hotel man of Eugene "fetched up" in Grants Pass one morning this week in a rather deplorable condition and represented to Mr. Love, of the Palace hotel of this city, that he had been drugged and robbed of \$200 the evening before at Robbersburg. Mr. Love put him to bed to let him sober off and when he got up he said he had telegraphed for money which was to have arrived at the bank here and wanted Mr. L. to identify him. When the time came the stranger was not to be found, and he was seen "hooding it" along the track toward Woodville by some parties. At Gold Hill he entered a saloon and bartered for a game of poker and left after paying for the drinks. It looks as though the man was out of his head as he said to be proprietor of the Minnesota House, at Eugene, and worth \$50,000 or \$60,000.—Courier.

NOT ELOPEMENT.—The elopement case at Junction this morning was dismissed on motion of Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Potter. The law makes it a crime to entice a girl under sixteen years of age from home, and the father of Edna Smith supposed she was under that age until this morning, when consulting the family records he found she was sixteen last April. Science in Bread Making.

At the recent annual meeting of the American Chemical Society, held in Washington, D. C., the question of the value of carbonate of ammonia as a leavening agent in bread, or as used in baking powders, came up for discussion, in which Prof. Barker, of the university of Pennsylvania, and president of the society, Dr. Richardson, late of the United States Department of Agriculture in Washington; Dr. Wm. McMurtrie, late Prof. of chemistry in the university of Illinois; Dr. E. H. Bartley, late chemist of the Brooklyn N. Y. board of health, and Prof. of chemistry of the Long Island college, and others took part.

The consensus of opinion was overwhelming in favor of the employment of ammonia. It was stated as a fact that ammonia rendered the gluten of the flour more soluble than the original gluten, and that the bread in which this action was produced by carbonate of ammonia must be more digestible and hence more healthful, and because of the extreme volatility of carbonate of ammonia, and its complete expulsion from the bread in the process of baking, it is one of the most useful, most healthful and most valuable leavening agents known.

These conclusions are borne out by the very elaborate and exhaustive experiments made by Prof. J. W. Mallet, of the university of Virginia, which show conclusively that bread made with a baking powder in which one per cent of carbonate of ammonia is used, in connection with cream of tartar and soda, is not only of uniformly better color and texture, but a product more wholesome, because the ammonia serves to neutralize any organic or lactic acids present in the flour.

THE BAPTIST.—The very interesting sessions of the Baptist convention continue, and will close tonight. About seventy-five have been present from outside, an exemplary company of Christian people. Last evening's session was devoted to education. Rev. C. A. Woolly, editor of the Pacific Baptist, delivered an able address on "Progress in Denominational Education." He was followed by Rev. G. W. Donnell, who took the duty of Baptists in Oregon to provide a higher education for their children, as his subject, which he handled in an interesting manner. Rev. Clay M. Hill spoke on "The True Education," which had a very healthy ring to it. This forenoon, after the introduction of appropriate resolutions, was devoted to young people's work; this afternoon to foreign missions. Tonight will be given to young people's work, and there will be addresses by Revs. G. E. Ellis, J. C. Read and L. D. Goodwin. The next convention will be held at Independence and Rev. J. C. Read will preach the sermon. The new board of managers are H. M. Clinton, of Portland; D. C. Lalonde, of Oregon City; W. B. Hall, of Portland; Dr. Jessup, of Salem; Rev. Ellis, of Baker City; and Rev. Crawford, of Roseburg.

A SHOT GUN CASE.—Today Mr. A. L. Cannon, of Peoria, came to Albany and swore out a complaint against David West for assault with a dangerous weapon. Mr. Cannon charges that last night he was going home in a buggy when Mr. West stopped him, pointed a shot gun at him and threatened to kill him, but changed his mind. They had had some trouble over a settlement of accounts, Mr. West having been working part of Mr. Cannon's farm. He once paid a fine for assaulting Mr. Cannon, and at another time one for assaulting Mr. McCormack. Mr. West also told Mr. Cannon, so that gentleman states, that if he had him arrested he would waylay him and shoot him, and then shoot himself.

We being in the city was arrested by Constable Burkhardt, and taken before Justice Humphrey and was being examined at press time.

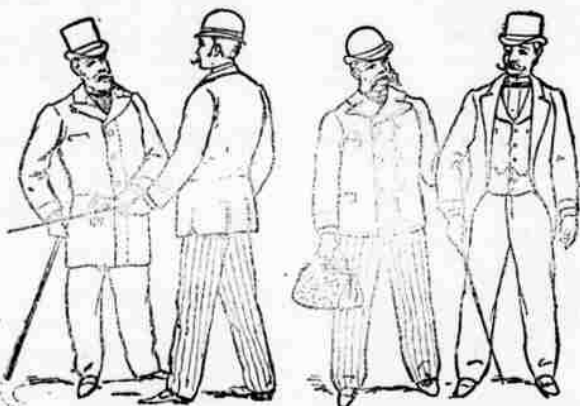

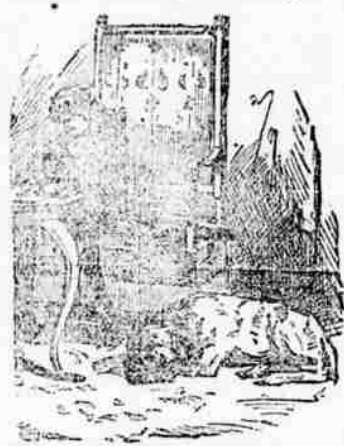

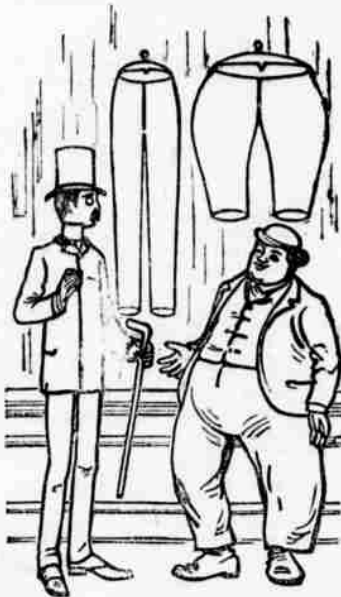
