

INTERESTED IN THE MINES.—A New York man wants to know about the Albany Co's Santiam mines. Here it is in a nutshell. The Albany Mining & Milling Co have twelve good claims and a capital stock of \$700,000. About \$50,000 have been spent in developing the mines, including the new ten stamp mill and saw mill. The saw mill is running with a capacity of about 10,000 feet a day and the stamp mill, one of the best on the coast, is being rapidly placed in position, and will be running in November, on the Bonanza claim. Two tunnels are now in 250 and 240 feet with shafts and cross cuts. The assays have been universally good. Forty tons of ore broken up by a small mill was the best test, showing nearly \$250 to the ton. The lead in the Bonanza is six to eight feet and seems inexhaustible. The company has enough ore in sight to last nearly a year. The mining district is a big one, sixty miles from Albany and about twenty from the Oregon Pacific railroad, and there is yet a big field there for prospectors. This is undoubtedly one of the finest camps in the U S and the work of the new mill, the DEMOCRAT predicts will verify the fact and open the eyes of the mining world. Some of the ore from the mines has been on exhibition at the exposition and will be taken east on the Oregon car. To experienced miners it speaks for itself at sight.

THE BAPTIST CONVENTION closed last evening after harmonious and interesting sessions. During the afternoon young peoples work brought out some interesting reports from all parts of Oregon. The address of O P Coshaw, Jr. of this city, was a comprehensive, well-gotten-up effort. Standing committees were appointed. Rev G W Hill, of this city, was a good selection as chairman of the committee on education. Rev Brownson heads the committee on denominational paper, Rev Hunsaker on foreign missions, Rev Parker on home missions, H M Clinton on Sunday schools, and Rev Woody on resolutions. Appropriate resolutions were passed, among others one heartily co-operating with all legitimate agencies for the suppression of the liquor traffic. Foreign missions were thoroughly discussed. In the evening addresses were delivered by Revs G T Ellis, L D Goodwin and J C Reed.

COLT E'LOGO and party arrived on last night's train from the east and immediately left on a special for Corvallis. He is here in response to the mandate of the court citing him to show cause on the 20th why he should not be removed as receiver. As usual numerous rumors have resulted, which it is hoped will prove true. If the arrival results in the payment of seven or eight months' back pay badly needed by a faithful set of employees it will be a big thing. It would be a bigger thing if it resulted in the organization of the road and its construction east. At the present time, though, it is safe to say the law suits on hand will first be attended to.

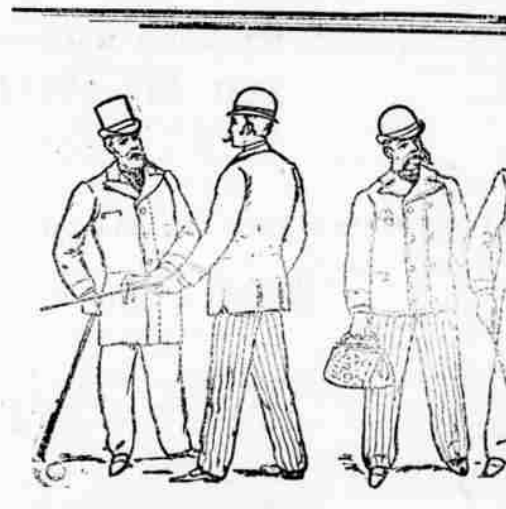
