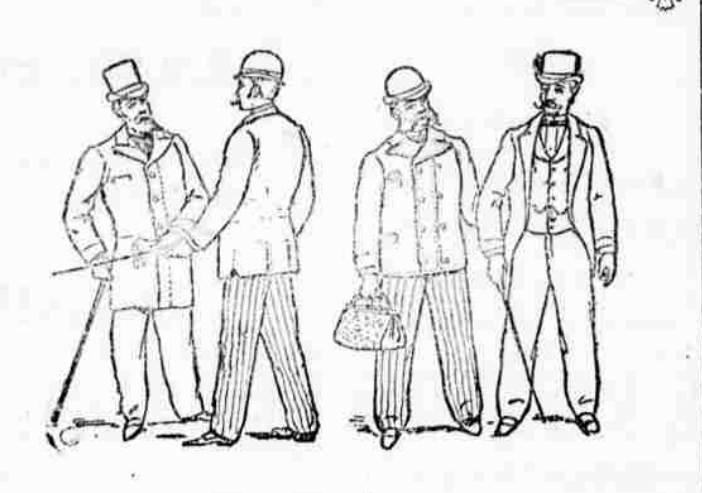

**A Wonderful Horse.**

STOCKTON, Calif Oct 20.—At the track today President Shippee shouted "Go," and Sunol went out to win the record that Marvin had been working for so long. Sunol was guided along just inside the center of the track which had been prepared for her, and Marvin cautioned her with his long drawn-out "whoa" to keep her from becoming too excited. She went to the quarter pole in 31 1/4 seconds, and kept on at her wonderful stride to the half mile post in 1:04 flat. Here Tim O'Brien came into the race with the runner. The mare came around the turn faster than any man on the grounds ever saw a trotter go, and reached the three-quarter post in 1:37. It was a great race against time as she came down the stretch to the finish, and the excited timers shouted: "She's got it!" "She'll beat it." Sunol came home in a magnificent finish. Marvin had the race and he encouraged the mare all the while by calling on her, but did not use the whip. Every body shouted as she went under the wire in 2:08 1/4. It was the greatest finish ever seen on a racetrack. Six timers compared their watches and they were exactly the same—2:08 1/4.

**The River at Corvallis.**

PORTLAND, Oct 20.—Major Handbury, United States engineer, has returned from a visit to Corvallis, where he went to examine the river in regard to improving it, he having been directed to submit a report to the department on water, and his present visit was for the purpose of viewing the situation at low water. The object of Major Handbury's visit was to collect data for his report in regard to some kind of a permanent improvement at this point. He has not yet decided what he will recommend.

**A Reign of Terror.**

SHANGHAI, Sept 24.—Vladivostok is undergoing a reign of terror. Fourteen convicts employed on the new Trans-Siberian railroad have escaped from the guards, and the only means they have of providing themselves with private clothes is by a succession of murders. They have already murdered five persons, three the inmates of one house, one a French naval officer belonging to the squadron in the port, and the other a Russian band-master. No arms can be purchased in Vladivostok, and those who have weapons keep them ready for instant use, as everybody fears an attack from the convicts.

**A Big Country Fire.**

WALWA WALLA, Wash, Oct 20.—There was a \$20,000 fire here tonight. The home of Pat Russell, a farmer, living on Spring creek, five miles from town, burned down, together with all his grain, outbuilding and machinery. The fire started in the barn after all the family had retired. It was discovered by one of the hired men, but too late to save anything, and Mr Russell's valuable papers and eight horses were burned. The insurance is \$8000. Russell had trouble with B. F. Wiseman over a half section of forfeited railroad land, and Monday he drove away a party of surveyors.

**An Explorer Arrived.**

SEATTLE Oct 20.—Professor Israel C. Russell, the Alaskan explorer, arrived from Victoria on the steamer Hermona, this afternoon, and is now registered at the Rainier. Professor Russell is a man of medium stature, with a square-cut black beard, slightly tinged with gray. His countenance expresses indomitable resolution. The professor was found in his room at the Rainier writing a brief description of his travels.
