TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Constantinople Captured.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—A special from New York to the Evening Journal says: The following cablegram has been received, which, it goes without saying, will not be generally credited until confirmed by subsequent advices: "News was received in this city from London today that Russia has practically captured Constantinople by the greatest coup de main of the century. On Monday, a large fleet of barges and vessels appeared on the Turkish coast of the Black sea near Derkos, a town about seventy miles northwest of Constantinople, and landed 12,000 Cossacks and 22,000 infantry. They seized the railroad along the coast from Constantinople to Iaidala, immediately crossed the coast range and seized another railway from Constantinople to Soffia, a town about sixty miles west of Constantinople. This commands the two roads to Constantinople, and gives the Russians control of the narrow wedge between the Black sea and the sea of Marmora. At the point of this wedge lies Constantinople.

Wonderful Horses.

STOCKTON, Cal Oct. 21.—Two more world records were broken on the Stockton track today: The Palo Alto yearling Bell Bird, driven by Charles Marvin, went against her record of 2:27 1/4 and made the mile in 2:25 1/4. The filly did not make a skip in the mile. Marvin then drove Arion, the 2 year old by Electioneer. He went against his record of 2:15 1/4, and made the mile without a skip, finishing wonderfully strong in 2:14 1/4. All the timers agreed, and veteran horsemen said the record would never be beaten by any other horse. Orrin Hickok said he never saw such a game finish. He added: "That is the horse that will make the two minute mark, if any horse ever does."

What Careless Child.

UNION, Or Oct. 21.—A fire broke out in the Cornucopia mining camp in the eastern part of Union county at 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning. A man had been sleeping in the office of Dr. Wood, and on going out in the morning, left a candle burning, from which it is supposed, the fire originated. This building is situated in the southern portion of the town on the east side of Main street. Before assistance could arrive the flames were beyond control. The office of Dr. Wood, the barber shop and residence of Thomas Babington, the Gallagher saloon building and the Babington blacksmith shop, were destroyed. No one was injured.

A Foolish Man.

PLYMOUTH, Pa Oct. 21.—Jacob Masterman an aged wealthy farmer, residing in Fairmont township, sixteen miles from here, committed suicide yesterday morning because his young wife eloped with William Belas, one of his farm hands. He tracked them to the railroad station, where he learned they had bought tickets to Philadelphia. Seven hundred dollars in money and his best team and carriage disappeared at the same time. He returned home and shot himself.

A Train Wreck.

MONMOUTH, Ill, Oct. 21.—Five persons were killed and fifty or sixty injured in a railway wreck here at 1 o'clock this morning on the Burlington railway. The Omaha & Denver fast express, which left Chicago last night ran into an open switch and the entire train was thrown from the track. Engineer Emery, and traveling engineer Courtney, who had gone into the cab before the wreck, were killed outright.
