Mr Blaine having expressed a desire that the Maine delegation should not make him a candidate. If, however, his name was presented by some other delegation, and he was nominated, he would not decline.

Miss Frances E Willard, the famous temperance lecturer, celebrated her fifty-second birthday at Rest Cottage, her home in Evanston, Ill, by trying to extinguish a fire that was burning up her barn in the rear of her residence. The fire broke out at 4 o'clock in the morning, and Miss Willard, hastily dressing, organized the ladies of her household into a fire brigade. The horse and carriage were saved, but the barn burned to the ground despite the efforts of the amateur fire fighters.

The woman knitters of the Island of Shetland produce marvellously beautiful work. A very fine long shawl, weighing only 2 1/4 ounces, was sold at Lerwick last year for \$75. A choice selection of knit goods, the finest ever produced in the islands, was presented to the Princess of Wales on the occasion of her marriage. One's enjoyment of the exquisitely fine work is considerably marred, however, by knowledge of the fact that the cruel custom of pulling out the fleece from the sheep by the roof is still practised in Shetland. The finest wool is obtained in this way, and the secretary of the long-named society should seek out the men who practise this savage custom, which is called "roughing."

THE OREGON PACIFIC.

As this is a leading topic of conversation we give the following from the New York Sun of Oct. 16, and it, at least, gives one version of the matter:

"Receiver T. Edgerton Hogg and his fellow managers of the Oregon Pacific railroad are between two pretty hot fires, and it now seems to be a question of only a few days before they will turn over the road, which they bonded for \$80,000 a mile, to practical railroad men. There was a meeting of bondholders yesterday, called by President Ralsion of the Farmers' Loan & Trust company, the trustees of the mortgage. It lasted all the afternoon and fiery words were the rule rather than the exception. A reporter of the Sun dropped into the meeting and heard the invective roll off from the lips of several of the speakers, as if their wrath was intended for someone present.

"There had been a meeting of bondholders in the spring, and a reorganization committee was appointed, but nothing was accomplished. Another reorganization committee with many of the same members was appointed yesterday, as follows: Alexander Brown, of Baltimore, Joseph Wharton, George B. McKim, and Linley Smith, of Philadelphia, Roland Hazard, George S. Coe, and James A. Blair, of New York. Mr Coe is chairman.

"The committee met after the meeting, and decided to bring another case in the Oregon court to oust Hogg from the receivership, with a proposition that if it is done, and if a responsible man is appointed in his place, the bondholders will agree to pay the employees' claim of \$100,000 for work; or, rather the bondholders will take up the receiver's certificates, which the men were paid with, but which are not legal tender in Oregon.

"F. K. Pendleton, the attorney of the bondholders, made a statement, giving an idea of how the management had run through with the money which it realized on the \$15,000,000 of first mortgage bonds that had been issued on the 140 miles of completed road, or over \$80,000 a mile.

"Mr Pendleton stated that \$11,000,000 cash was realized on the total issue, and that according to Hogg's admissions \$2,000,000 of this had gone to pay interest on the bonds. The receiver had paid out another \$1,500,000 in commissions, interest, and for carrying the floating debt, and \$5,000,000 of the bonds had been put out as collateral for the floating debt. The receiver had admitted that he had sold \$300,000 worth of receiver's certificates, and he had paid himself (Hogg) \$150,000 more of certificates for money advanced on steamboats.

"But after taking out all these items there remains over \$7,000,000 of cash to be accounted for, Mr Pendleton explained. He said that Hogg told him that it had been put into the road. If so, this would be bonding the 140 miles of road at \$50,000 a mile. The mortgage contract allowed only \$25,000 a mile. The Sun reporter gathered from the meeting that the bondholders did not believe half of that amount was spent on the road. Then what has become of it? was asked. 'How much property did Hogg have before he took hold of the Oregon Pacific?' asked one.

"This point was discussed for a long time by the committee, and many unpleasant things were mentioned. But there was no doubt about the general feeling.

"The bondholders say that when they were induced to invest they understood that the bonds would be issued only as fast as the construction of the road progressed. The project was to build a road 600 miles long, from Yaquina bay, Oregon, to Boise City, Idaho, but after eight years only 140 miles have been completed from Yaquina City to Coe, Or. The 600 miles would have admitted of \$15,000,000 at \$25,000 a mile, but the 140 miles called for only \$3,500,000. The bondholders interpret the mortgage to mean that the bonds shall be issued only for road under construction, but Hogg says that it means 'contemplated road.'

"There seems to be no doubt, at any rate, that the bondholders were ignorant until last fall of what a cargo of bonds Hogg was issuing. They had received their interest, and that was all they cared for at the time. Hogg's appointment as receiver last fall was a clever bit of work, and it was done so quietly that most of the bondholders didn't know what was up until too late. Some of his friends who were bondholders sent in a request to the trust company for the appointment of Hogg, and the whole thing was carried through in a day."
