ON HIS WAY TO THE PEN.—A D Webster, formerly of this city, passed through Albany on Tuesday for Salem, where, according to the sentence of Judge Pipes, he will spend ten years in the state penitentiary, as a punishment for the murder of Robert Fales, though Webster declared to an Albany man, who conversed with him on the train, that the grand jury and circuit judge had agreed to sign a petition for his release in a year, which is very doubtful. Webster said he was not sorry for killing Fales, asserting that he only acted in self-defense, which seems to be a different view of the matter from that taken by the jury. The affair all arose from Fales demanding \$17 for working seventeen days in Webster's hotel, whereas the latter claimed only \$2 was due him.

A GOOD APPOINTMENT.—The following from the Oregonian tells about the husband of a former resident of Albany, as well as one himself for several months: The executive committee of the port of Portland commission, have appointed Mr. George W. Freeman, engineer, to have charge of the work of improving the river contemplated by the committee, under direction of Major Handbury, United States engineers. Mr. Freeman is fully competent to have charge of the work, having been in charge of the jetties at the mouth of the river under both Captains Powell and Major Handbury, and afterward engineer of maintenance of way for the Southern Pacific company. He has been in the employ of the United States engineers' department for eight years, and the commission and Major Handbury both have confidence in his ability.

We advise our Kansas friends not to attempt any squatting on the Albany prairie, though they may do that with impunity in the Cascades on land that will eventually be valuable property, perhaps even for wheat raising.

A FINGER OFF.—This forenoon Mr. Geo W Hochstetler, of the G P S P D & L Co., while running a buzz planer, caught his left hand in the rapidly revolving knives. The middle finger was so badly cut as to require amputation. Drs. Maston & Davis dressed the wound, amputating the finger between the first and second joints.

A SHOVEL FIGHT.—Two laborers on the Lebanon ditch got into a dispute over something of considerable less importance than the independence of Ireland, and fought it out with shovels, one getting a live whack on the head. One of the men is said to be insane and the man who did the live hitting was afraid of him.

A NEEDED IMPROVEMENT.—The new sewer system for the public school building has arrived and is being rapidly put in place. When this is completed the old will be removed. The board of directors have adopted what they consider to be the best; and it is believed that the best sanitary interests of the school will be guarded by the course already adopted.

A RECEPTION.
Last evening from 4 to 6, at the residence of Mr. James V. Pipe, a reception was tendered the visiting clergymen of the Episcopal church, who have been holding several missionary meetings in the church at this city. It was a delightful affair, well planned and greatly enjoyed by all, by none more than by the clergymen, who had the privilege of being present. At 5 o'clock a delicious repast was served, conferring credit on the ladies who got it up. It was a social feast as well as a live conversation added to the affair. A half hour was spent in sociability, during which Rev. Short, Rev. Prichard and Rev. Lund were heard in well rendered vocal solos. Among those present were: Bishop Morris, Rev. Plummer, Rev. Lovelidge, Rev. Van Waters, Rev. Vosberg, Rev. Short, Rev. Lund, Rev. Patway, from other cities; Mr and Mrs E N Beach, of Colfax, Wash.; Rev. Prichard, President and Mrs E N Condit, Rev and Mrs J F Stewart, Rev and Mrs T J Wilson, Mr and Mrs H G Watson, Mr and Mrs S S Train, Mr and Mrs Thos Jones and son, Mrs John Briggs and daughter, Mrs W B Barr, Mrs M E Ferrell and son, Mrs Thos Monteth, Sr., Mrs Enos, Miss Tiny Monteth and Mr and Mrs Natting, of Albany.

The session of Presbytery yesterday afternoon was devoted to reports from the field. These were all of a most encouraging character. Never has the Presbytery had a report that had in it so much to give them pleasure. Rev Mr Crabbe, of Los Angeles, and Rev Dr Gibson, of San Francisco, also spoke of the work in their respective Presbyteries. The Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator. It will probably be called together some time during the meeting of the synod to attend to some matters of business.

At 7:30 p m the synod convened. In spite of the steady down-pour of rain, a good audience was present. The retiring moderator, Rev W W Logan, preached the sermon. He was assisted in the opening exercises by Revs Crabbe and Spaulding. The text was Matt. 28: 19, 20, and the theme, "The Christianization of America."

At the close of the sermon the moderator "constituted" the synod by prayer. The roll was then called. It showed a very small attendance. Pending the election of a moderator, the synod adjourned.

At 9 o'clock this morning the synod assembled. The election of moderator resulted in the choice of Rev H W Crabbe of Los Angeles. In a neat speech, Mr Crabbe assumed the duties of the office. Mr Crabbe has been pastor of the church in Los Angeles for the last four years. Previous to that he was in charge of a large congregation in Buffalo, N. Y. Committees were appointed and various matters referred to them, and then the synod took a recess to allow the various committees to get matters into shape to report.

At noon another elegant lunch was served by the ladies at the residence of Mrs Walter Monteth. It was as bountiful and as appetizing as the one of yesterday; and more could not be said. This afternoon the subject of Church Finances and the various Mission Boards are under consideration.

This evening a sermon will be preached by the Rev W A Spaulding, of Spokane.
