

OREGON CITY'S WOOLLEN MILL.—As the statement has been made that weavers' wages are being reduced in the Oregon City woolen mill, it is of interest to learn that the wages of the best weavers, on the best work, during the months of August and September, were several times as follows: \$31.55, \$48, \$46, \$42, \$48.87, \$48 (a woman), \$51, \$41 (an old man), \$58, \$46, \$48, \$44, etc. It is true, nevertheless, that the wages of the girls and women who weave blankets and flannels are not over an average of \$1.10 a day. The mill has piled up its product and, in sympathy with the dull and overstocked Eastern market, has been obliged to make a reduction in its wholesale prices of 10 to 20 per cent, which shows once more that protection does not keep up home prices, but that prices are regulated by supply and demand.—Oregon City Courier.
