

GROVER CLEVELAND.

There is no longer any question but what Grover Cleveland is by all odds the choice of the rank and file of the American democracy, and enjoys the confidence and respect of the American people to a larger extent than any other living man. The mention of his name in any public assembly, in any place in the United States is the signal for deafening cheers and his appearance on the platform anywhere causes unbounded applause.

At the great demonstration in Portland where there was no effort to create enthusiasm for Cleveland, but a desire to direct it otherwise, on the bare mention of his name the cheering made all other candidates seem insignificant. At the great ratification meeting in New York when he arose to introduce the speakers the cheering for Cleveland and the next president was so great that it was several minutes before he could perform the service, and when he appeared for the purpose of opening the state campaign before the Kings county democracy, the enthusiasm was so great that the people could not be restrained for several minutes. It is the same everywhere, east, west, north or south, whenever the people assemble his name is received with unbounded enthusiasm. The machine politicians may scheme, plot and figure, but the people still remain loyal to Cleveland. His influence with the masses has passed beyond their control. The people have tried Cleveland and found in him "a friend that sticketh closer than a brother," one who will stand firmly against every scheme of plunder, injustice and oppression, and no power of money or influence or corporations can buy, persuade or drive him. He believes in the equality of all men and the interests of the present are as sacred to him as that of the millionaire. He talks to the cattle kings when they undertake to evade the law; to the railroad corporations when they undertake to steal the people's land, just as he does to the common laborer. He thinks that the humble homes of the poor should feel some of the beneficent influence of the government and their wrongs strike a responsive chord in his great heart. Nothing but treachery among politicians and the gold of corporations and favored interests or the act of God can prevent him from being the next president.

It is, however, said by some that he is not in harmony with the people of the Pacific coast on the silver question. But how infinitely small is the silver question to the great questions of honest government, justice and equality, and the personal and commercial liberty of the people.

The vast wealth of the people of the United States, heaped up by a century of toil and privation, is passing into the coffers of taxation, at the rate of nearly a million and a half a day; and into the pockets of the favored classes in a much larger sum. The people are being moved by the campaign of education and therefore turn to Cleveland on account of his known opposition to all forms of plunder and class legislation. —LaKe County Examiner.
