A BIG INCREASE.—The footings of the assessment roll for 1891 have been added for the net taxable property of Linn county and show a marked increase over 1890, speaking for the efficient manner in which Assessor Williams has done his work, now being large enough to give Linn county the second place in the state, unless Marion county also shows considerable increase. The figures for the net taxable property, on which the levy is made, for the years 1890 and 1891 are as follows:

1890.....\$7,581,844

1891.....6,490,028

Increase.....\$1,091,816

On the same levy of last year this would increase the revenue \$19,652.68. As the county at the beginning of the year was nearly \$25,000 in debt, and is now out of debt, it is probable the same tax will be levied, which some have figured would thus provide for the \$40,000 for the bridge.

THE CORRECT FIGURES.—The exact dimensions of the bridge over the Willamette at this city, under the cantilever plan, have never been published, being different from the original plans. Here are the figures. The Albany approach will be 414 feet long; first span 300.3 feet; the second span, which crosses the main stream, 400.2 feet; the third span, 391.5 feet; the fourth span, 292 feet; the Benton county approach, 250 feet. The total length will be 1958 feet. It will be seen that the bridge itself will have four spans and five piers, its total length being 1294 feet. Two piers will be in Linn and three in Benton county. The bridge itself in the latter county will cross the temporary stream occurring in case of very high water. These figures are furnished by Surveyor Duff, of the Portland Bridge company.

LANE COUNTY MINES.—A tunnel 40 feet long is now being dug through a ridge at the Myrtle Creek mines to connect the new ditch with the old one and then the ditching will be completed for the present. The men are now working in three shifts and are working night and day. Washing will be resumed in two or three weeks and some big cleanups are then looked for. Two giants will be run all the time this winter and part of the time it is probable three or four will be operated. Gold to the value of \$4800 was brought out of the Anna mine last week, the result of a week's run. We understand that the owners of this mine claim

BAKING POWDERS.

What the Minnesota State Authorities Know About Them.

The Dairy and Food Commission and the State Chemist are the highest official authorities upon such subjects in the State, and their evidence will be accepted as disinterested and unprejudiced. It is their business to examine the quality of the different food products, and to suppress the sale of those found impure and unwholesome, and all will admit that they have performed their duties without fear or favor.

At a recent examination by a Legislative committee to determine the qualities of the various baking powders sold in Minnesota, State Chemist and analyst to the Food and Dairy Commission, Dr Benjamin F Drew, gave the following evidence:

Ques.—Dr Drew, I see by the report of the Dairy and Food Commission of this state that in making analysis of the various baking powders of this country you report as a result of your work that the Royal Baking Powder contains and gives off in baking a greater per cent of carbonic acid gas (leavening gas) than any other baking powder made; is that true?

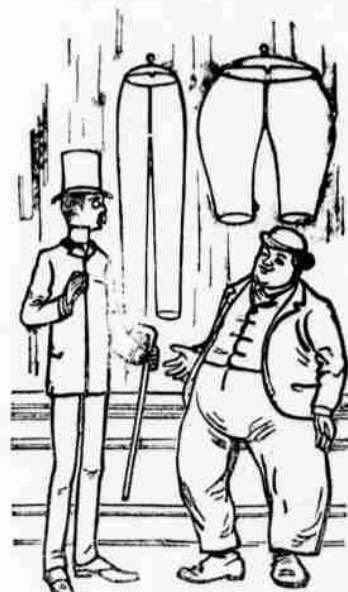
