Too Much for Them.—A B Seal, the commercial tourist, who has just returned from a trip to northern California brings a long story, of which the following is the cream: Down in Yreka, Calif., an Israelitish merchant opened a store after having done business in Redding. He began marking his goods low, and the other merchants united against him, one taking the competition into his hands for all of them. The Jew placed his overalls out at 90 cents. The gentile dropped to 75 cents, and so the figures decreased until the Jew marked his overalls at 15 cents. Then the gentile began another plan and among others put out the sign, "We buy for cash, get a discount of 7 1/2 per cent, and will give our customers the benefit." The Jew settled that in a very quick way with the sign, "We buy our goods on time, pay 7 1/2 cents on the dollar, thereby getting a discount of 92 1/2 per cent, and will give our customers the benefit." This closed the competition.

His Item.—Warm Spring Johnny has been a familiar character around Albany for many years. Until a few years ago he lived with the Indians and had a squaw wife, Lucy, who died. The Indians were the means of sending him to the penitentiary, and he swore off associating with them. He afterwards married a white woman, with whom he has lived two or three years. Now a separation has been made and Johnny says some white people are worse than some Indians, and he is authority for the statement that on Wednesday he fought a duel with a man named Holthes in the city cemetery over family affairs. Several shots, he says, were fired and Holthes received a cuticle wound, and is now recuperating in the forks of the Santiam. Some people look on this report with suspicion, but Johnny is certainly entitled to a good item once a year.

Horse Thieves.—On the night of Oct. 27, two mares were stolen from Daniel Stanton, at Coburg. One of the thieves is 50 years old, six feet high, short gray whiskers. The other is 37 years old, five feet ten inches high and wore plaid checked suit. The horses are described as follows: "One is a bay, with four white feet and face, has a black spot about the size of a dollar on the right flank. One is a black mare with a few white hairs in the face. The stolen team was hitched to an old hack, with panel bed, painted black. They had on old work harness and new bridles."

Snow Towns.—The Ineg show after leaving Salem gave it a black eye as a countrified town. The Statesman calls the troupe several pet names and also says what might be said of some other Oregon cities: "Salem would be a better show town if it had less Jim Crow shows, made up from morphine fiends and women of questionable repute, like the company that recently attempted to give us a black eye." Several such troupes have been given a cold shoulder by the Albany management, Ineg among the number. They were not here.

A Wife Beater.—Sheriff W H Samson visited Salem Wednesday, returning north yesterday, in search for Chas Dodge, who is wanted at Oregon City to answer to a charge of assault preferred by his wife. Dodge has relatives at Salem and also at Brooks, at one of which places the Clackamas sheriff expected to find him as he fled immediately upon having it intimated to him that a warrant for his arrest was about to be issued.—Statesman. The defendant, we believe, was a resident of Albany a year ago.

The product of a ten-acre apple orchard in the Rogue river valley, near Grant's Pass, was sold last week to the Earl Fruit Company, of San Francisco, for \$4,550. The price paid was 65 cents per box, the buyer did the picking, packing and furnished boxes. The apples were of the red winter variety and were packed for the Australian and Japan markets.

The woolen mill now runs but four days a week on account of the glut in the market of such goods as the mill turns out. The high-priced labor can endure this involuntary idleness, but it is hard on the men who support families on a wage of \$1 to \$1.10 per day.—Oregon City Courier. The Albany mills have their hands full filling orders working six days a week.

Ellensburg, Wash., must be in a very bad way, judging from the following: "The white laundry of this city closed some six months ago. Now the Chinamen are closing their wash houses and quitting the business. How the washing will be done is a matter of conjecture. About half the wash houses owned by Celestials have quit and soon soiled linen will be the rule.

A Dallas paper gets affectionate as follows: Our neighbor, the Sun, appears to understand the fellow who presides over the columns of the ring organ, and classified the thing quite intelligently last night. We have known the creature for a long time, and can verify the statement that he has proved himself a consummate fraud and failure in everything he has undertaken for many years past.

The Journal yesterday made two large yearly contracts with eastern advertisers, who, after thoroughly canvassing the matter with local dealers, decided to place their ads with a live paper that circulates extensively among the people.—Salem Journal.

Two eastern patent medicine firms applied to the Statesman day before yesterday for the insertion of advertisements on yearly contracts. They offered about one-tenth of the regular rates of the paper charged other people, and, of course, were not accepted.—Salem Statesman.

Portland people are opposed to a railroad to Astoria, simply because it will make that city the seaport instead of Portland, and it is this fact principally that explains why Astoria has never had a road. A writer in the Talk shows how wheat is 20 cents more per cental in San Francisco than in Portland, and 11 cents more in Tacoma. This simply means that the farmers of the Willamette valley receive 10 to 12 cents a cental, or 6 or 7 cents per bushel less for their wheat than the regular market should give them. Oregon prices should equal California prices.

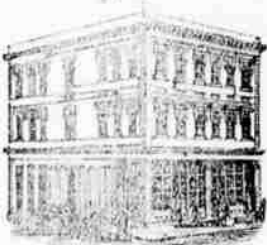
