

To-morrow elections will be held in a large number of states, but only those of Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, and Iowa are of any political significance. Since before the war Massachusetts has been a reliably republican state. In the presidential elections since 1872 the republicans have carried the state at each with majorities ranging from 32,027 the lowest to 74,300 the highest. In the elections for governor the republicans have carried all but two, with majorities ranging from 1968 to 46,516. In 1882 the democrats, owing to serious divisions among the republicans, elected the governor by 13,949 majority and last year they elected the governor by 9,053 majority. They have renominated Wm E R Russell for governor and he has made a very strong campaign. The republicans have made a very active campaign. The issues have been Russell's administration and the tariff. There are hopes that Russell will be elected, though none of the others of the state ticket will be. The campaign in New York has been the hottest for years. The issues have been up on the defeat of New York in getting the World's fair, and the influence of Tammany in state politics. Both parties have been handicapped somewhat but the indications are that Flower, the democratic candidate for governor will be elected by a majority of 10,000 to 25,000. Since 1872 the democrats have elected three and the republicans four governors. In Iowa the issue has been on the dead letter prohibition law and the tariff. Boies whom the democrats elected for governor in 1889 by a plurality of 6,523 has been renominated. He has made a most thorough campaign, while his republican opponent, Wheeler, who can not make a speech, has been making a still hunt. While Boies has taken strong ground in favor of the repeal of the prohibition law, yet his chief and daily appeal has been to farmers and labor people on the tariff question. If he is elected (and, with democrats, there seem very few doubts of it,) he will owe his election to defections among republican farmers on the tariff question. Democrats have considerable hopes of electing a majority in legislature.

But the great fight of the day is between Governor Campbell and McKinley. The tariff issue has overshadowed everything else and it is a matter of regret that the sentiment of the voters of the state on this question could not have been clearly divided. There are from 4000 to 8000 democrats in Cincinnati, Cleveland and Toledo, who became enemies to Governor Campbell in the early part of his administration, who have been antagonizing the governor and who have declared their purpose to defeat him. Excepting in these three cities, the governor is popular in all the state. He will not lose 500 votes from his party on account of his tariff views. He has made a most attractive campaign. McKinley is a man of acknowledged ability and strict integrity. He will not lose 500 votes from his party except it be on account of his tariff views. How many these will be is the problem in Tuesday's election. Ohio, like Massachusetts, since before the war, has been safely republican, though she has wavered some what more than the latter. Her majorities for president since 1872 have all been republican and have ranged from 7,516 to 36,368. Harrison had 19,599. Since 1872 the democrats have elected three and the republicans four governors. The normal republican majority is about 25,000. So that assuming that the Farmers Alliance ticket draws equally from the two parties, McKinley, (with his advantage on account of democratic defection,) should have from 30,000 to 35,000 to make the victory one for protection. All indications point to a small vote for the Farmers Alliance ticket. Campbell has made a strong appeal to farmers on the tariff and we believe it has not been made in vain. If McKinley has but 10,000 to 15,000 majority it will be a practical condemnation of protectionism. Republicans claim the state by 20,000 and democrats by 10,000. In Pennsylvania the only question is the rascallies of Quay and his crew in looting the treasury for years.

The Washington correspondent of the Oregonian telegraphed that paper yesterday, summing up the elections to-morrow in this way:

Flower will probably be elected in New York by 10,000 majority. McKinley will probably carry Ohio by 15,000 majority. Allen, republican, will be elected governor in Massachusetts. Indications are that Boies, democrat, will be reelected governor of Iowa. Democrats will probably carry Pennsylvania. All of this leaves us just where we were before, but it is evidently the best the gentleman could do.

Secretary of the treasury Foster claims that McKinley will have 25,000 majority over Campbell and that the republicans will elect 21 of the 31 senators and 71 of the 107 members of the lower house. Democrats rather concede the legislature to the republicans but claim they will elect the governor by 10,000 majority.

Records show that during the rebellion 1504 blockade runners were captured or destroyed, valued at \$7,000,000, with cargoes valued at \$23,000,000, a total of \$30,000,000. To that add over \$16,000,000 England paid to settle the Alabama claims, and it will be seen that what she made by trying to help the cause of the "good north" was not all profit.

The grange cause is flourishing all over the state, according to the reports of Secretaries from different granges. We are expecting a grand revival of grange interest the coming winter. If each county of the state was as well organized as Linn, the influence it would carry with it would be manifest on every hand. Let farmers and all who are eligible to membership take hold of the matter in earnest, and they will never have cause for regret.

The weather for the last ten days has been unfavorable for seeding, many are far behind with their fall work, as much fallow ground has not yet been sowed. But a few dry days and the ground will be in good condition for the seeds, and many acres of grain will yet be sown.

The apple crop in many parts of Linn county was immense, as there is hundreds of bushels of apples laying in the orchards, which will be allowed to rot, as there is no sale for them. There should be some means of taking care of all fruit raised in this valley. REPORTER.

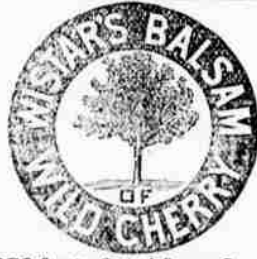
