TELEGRAPHIC NEWS
THE ELECTIONS.
Democrats Ahead.
PORTLAND, Nov 4.—Results so far show
that Flower of N. Y., McKinley of Ohio,
Boies of Iowa and Russell, of Mass., are
elected. The majorities are: Flower, 40,000
McKinley, 20,000; Russell, 8,000; Boies,
6,000. Pennsylvania goes republican, New
York legislature is in doubt.
PORTLAND, Nov 4.—New Jersey is dem-
ocratic by a large majority. Pennsylvania
republican by 50,000.
Republican congressman elected in South
Dakota by a large majority. Colorado re-
publican. Ohio legislature strongly republi-
can. Massachusetts, Iowa and New York
legislatures in doubt.
NEW YORK, Nov 4.—Democrats claim
the assembly by 9 majority, the senate is
probably a tie, giving the democrats a safe
majority on joint ballots. Returns show
Iowa and Massachusetts legislatures to be
in doubt.
BALTIMORE, Md Nov 4.—Brown for gov-
ernor and the entire democratic state ticket
is elected by about 32,000. The senate will
be democrats, 19, republicans, 7. The
house will be democratic by not less than
thirty majority. One hundred and twenty-
four out of the 128 election districts in Bal-
timore city give Latrobe for mayor 99,846,
and Warfield 6,159. Latrobe and the entire
democratic ticket will have about 6500 majority
RICHMOND, Va Nov 4.—At 1:40 a m the
democrats claim every senatorial district
in the state. The democrats will have at
least four fifths of the house. The alliance
have two candidates, and one "straight on"
republican has been elected.
NEW YORK, Nov 3.—Complete returns of
Elmira City, Fasset's home, show a plurality
for Flower of 504.
An Associated press bulletin at 11 o'clock
tonight says: Election returns from all parts
of the state show that Fasset's majority in
the fifty-five counties north of the Harlem
river will not exceed that of Davenport in 1885
which was 49,271. Flower's majority south
of the Harlem river will be about 72,000.
Returns indicate a republican gain of two
in the senate, and four in the assembly.
It is estimated that Flower will pass Harlem
river with over 70,000 plurality. It is not
thought Fasset will have more than 40,000
above Harlem river which will make Flower's
majority about 30,000.
CINCINNATI, Nov 3.—At midnight Camp-
bell concedes McKinley's election by 15,000.
The chairman of the republican state central
committee at 1:45 a m claims the state by
from 19,000 to 20,000, and the general as-
sembly from 31 to 33 on joint ballot. The
republicans have carried all the close counties
for the legislature.
The democratic committee concedes Mc-
Kinley's by 10,000, and a republican legisla-
ture. McKinley's plurality will be materi-
ally increased, and will no doubt exceed
20,000.
DES MOINES, Nov 3.—Returns throughout
the state indicate that Boies is elected by a
reduced plurality. The vote however will
be very close, and the democratic plurality
will not likely be more than 2000.
PHILADELPHIA, Nov 3.—Philadelphia
complete gives Gegg (Rep) for auditor gen-
eral 28,526 plurality. Two thirds of the
state, outside of Philadelphia, gives Gregg
27,143 plurality. Morrison (rep) for state
treasurer has about the same, while McCreeary
for city treasurer, has over 20,000 majority.
TERREHA, Kan Nov 3.—It is evident at this
hour (11 p m) that there has been republi-
can gains in every county in the state. The
question that the farmer's alliance party has
lost strength is verified. The republicans
now carry a majority of the counties in
westward.

CHICAGO, Nov 3.—With the exception of
two candidates, the complete returns show the
republicans made a clean sweep today in the
city and county. The two exceptions are L
M Cooley, the democratic candidate for drain-
age trustee, and Babcock, the democratic
candidate for county superintendent of schools.
For the first time in many years the republi-
cans secured absolute control of the county,
board, not a single democratic candidad pull-
ing through. The republican majorities range
from 3000 to 10,000, against 897 in the last
county election.

BOSTON, Nov 3.—Gov Russell, dem, esti-
mates his majority at 5000. Corcoran, dem, for
lieutenant governor, is confident of his own
election. The Journal and Advertiser, both
republican, concede Russell's election.

LINCOLN, Neb Nov 3.—Meager returns
indicate that Post, Rep, will go out of the
county with nearly 20,000 plurality over
Edgarton, Ind. Returns from all over the
state indicate that Post is running slightly
ahead of his ticket.

TRENTON, N J, Nov 3.—New Jersey
complete gives the following results:

Assembly..... 21 43
Joint ballot..... 26 56
Rep Dem.

BOSTON, Nov 3.—The returns are slow
in coming in. The returns up to midnight
show democratic gains which will elect Russell
by 5000 to 5000.

RICHMOND, Va, Nov 3.—Scattering returns
indicate the election of democrats to the
house from Brunswick and Dinwiddie counties
which were republican in the last legislature.
The democrats have elected 11 out of 19 state
senators and 70 out of 100 members of the
house.

A shipwreck
ASTORIA, Or Nov 3.—Twenty days ago
the splendid iron ship Strathblane set sail
from Honolulu for Portland with a crew of
thirty, all told, and two passengers. Tonight,
all that remains of the ship is a battered and
broken hull, floating in pieces in a fearful
surf on North Beach, about midway between
Loomis and Eastbrook, nine miles north of
Cape Disappointment. At 11 miles north
and close by the terrible action of the waves,
are the dead bodies of Captain Thomas Cut-
hill, D McLeod, carpenter; Richard Hughes,
seaman, and Thomas Hunter, cook. The
body of the passenger, Mr Lewis, has not yet
been recovered. All the rest of the crew are
safe, although several of them received pre-
tly rough treatment, and sustained a great
many bruises before they reached the shore.
Two of the apprentices being seriously ill at
Mr Loomis' house. The rescued members
of the crew were taken to Ilwaco and will
be brought to the city tomorrow.
