Sir John Bennett Lawes has made his usual annual estimate of the yield of wheat in the British Isles in 1891. Adopting 30 bushels to the acre as an average, and estimating the requirements of consumers at about 29,500,000 quarters, an importation of 20,000,000 quarters, or 16,000,000 bushels, of foreign wheat will be necessary.

The fastest regular train run in England is from Grantham to Retford, on the Great Northern railway. One train covers the distance, 33 1/4 miles, in 36 minutes, at the rate of 55 1/2 miles from Grantham to King's Cross, London, at the rate of 54 miles an hour.

Albert Bushnell Hart writes in the New England Magazine that confederate Secretary or War Sellen fixed an official price of \$40 per bushel for wheat and then sold his crop to the confederacy at that figure. There were so few things of that kind done that it may be worth while to chronicle them.

Perhaps the largest United States flag ever made was flung to the breeze at Chillicothe Falls, Mass., several days ago. It measures 41 by 71 feet.
