**A LITIGATING COMMUNITY.**—The following from the Beaver Creek, Santiam precinct, correspondence in the Lebanon Express, is one of the best examples we have seen of how men will go to law in small matters in order to vindicate a principle, or something else: "About a year ago one citizen caused the arrest and arraignment of another in Judge Savage's court, for calling plaintiff a 'white eyed cayuse' with a few cuss words prefixed. A jury brought in the verdict, not cause for action. Plaintiff brought an appeal to the circuit court, the county was persuaded to pay the cost. Through some difference of opinion as to who should have the cost, the constable had the plaintiff arrested for drawing his county warrant. He was tried and discharged in Justice Humphrey's court at Albany. Next came an old gentleman and brought civil action against his neighbor for wages of one or two days work, a borrowed chain and some wagon hire. He got his chain returned and a part of the amount sued for. Next some sawmill men claimed that one of their hired men had traded their fine Arabian mare, which was highly decorated with natural spots, for a 'cultus' and brought action against the possessor of the mare to recover property, but the papers being irregular the case was thrown out of court. The last case is that of one neighbor trying three times in succession to bring civil action against another to recover \$5 pasturage on a colt but all three efforts utterly failed to bring the defendant before the solemn visage of a Canadian judge; however, through the help of one of Lebanon's able attorneys, plaintiff succeeded in obtaining judgment. The colt is only valued at \$6 and the case will be taken to the circuit court."

**\$3 A MILE.**—Two carloads of lumber from Giesville, consigned to G M Devaney, of this city, were brought in last week, the cars being transferred at Shelburn to the S P, then to the Seio branch at West Seio. The freight charges were somewhat binding, however, as they were \$18 per car from Giesville to this city, \$9 on the O P, a distance of about 30 miles, and \$9 on the S P to this city, a distance of but three miles. Seems to us that the railroad commission should make some inquiry into this matter.—Press.

**THE JURY DISAGREE.**—This morning at 9:30 o'clock the jury came in in the Ingram case, and on reporting that it was impossible for them to agree were discharged. The DEMOCRAT learns that the following was the way in which they stood: For murder in first degree: W S Elliott, Peter Bither, W E Potter and A J Davis. For murder in second degree: S S Myers, Ab Humphrey, J N Gulliford, and A J Shelton. For acquittal: G C Moon, J B Murnford, John Wright, and Frank Peterson.

**BROUGHT TO ALBANY.**—Chief of Police Hoffman returned last night from Seattle with J C Stoll, the "young man whom he had arrested on complaint of O C McFarland on charge of forging his father's name. Mr Stoll asserts that he had always been authorized to sign his father's name, and that the reason the check was procured was because his father thought he was spending too much money. He was taken before Justice Humphrey this morning and held under \$300 bonds to appear on next Monday, when it is thought the matter will be settled. He was in jail in Seattle five days, an experience he did not enjoy very much.

**AN ERROR IN FIGURING THE TOTALS** in the assessment roll gave Linn county a larger net value of taxable property than it is entitled to. The correct figures are \$6,741,341, which is an increase of \$25,816 over last year. A good showing, though not as big as reported. It will still give Linn third place. The tax levy will probably be made next month, on the figures given, and will, it is thought, not be increased very much over last year, if any.

**ALBANY PUBLIC SCHOOL.**  
The rules, regulations and course of study adopted by our School Board for the more efficient management of Albany public school is one of the most comprehensive yet published in the state. As it has been ordered that one copy be furnished each family patronizing the school, we give only a few leading extracts:  
The public school shall be classified as Primary and Grammar departments.  
The Primary department shall consist of the First, Second, Third and Fourth grades. The Grammar department shall consist of the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eighth grades.  
The course of study which is printed in full is one hitherto adopted in this district, and is similar to the course used by the Salem public schools. Instead of a nine years' course, it has been cut down to eight years with the same amount of work. The studies are such as are used in every grammar school with a primary department, such as the public schools of Portland, Salem or San Francisco.

Each pupil who will have acceptably completed the course of study prescribed, shall receive a diploma signed by the County School Superintendent, Principal and the Board of Directors.  
The school year shall consist of forty weeks, or two hundred school days, including legal holidays.  
The first term shall commence on the second Monday in September of each year, and shall continue twenty weeks. The second term shall commence on the Monday following the close of the first term, and shall continue twenty weeks.  
During school days teachers are required to be about the school premises from 8:30 a m to 4 o'clock p m, at which latter time they are to disperse in such a manner as to go at least three blocks with the pupils. During recesses and noons, the teachers and pupils are allotted portions of the school premises in such a manner as to give every pupil the benefit of a teachers' presence and influence even during playtime. This arrangement will make immoral conduct about the school an impossibility.

The only valid excuse for tardiness (except as provided in Rule 45) shall be:  
1. Sickness of the pupil.  
2. Sickness of some member of the family requiring immediate attendance of the pupil at home.  
3. Danger to health from serious exposure.  
4. Some urgent cause rendering punctuality impossible or extremely inconvenient.

In case of absence or tardiness the pupils shall bring on their return to school an excuse in writing from their parents or guardians, stating the reason for such absence or tardiness.  
In case of fire alarm:  
1. Rapid ringing of hand bell, all pupils turn.  
2. Second tap arise.  
3. Third tap, all march outside of yard.  
The tuition of non-resident pupils per quarter of twelve weeks shall be as follows: Grade one, two, three, four, \$5. Grades five, six, seven and eight, \$7.50. The following questions will assist pupils in determining whether they are non-residents:  
Where were you last enumerated?  
Where is the home of your parents or guardian?

Did you come to this district solely for school purposes?  
How long do you intend to remain in this district?  
Are you willing to make affidavit that your only home is in this district?
