The First Proclamation.
 SALEM, Or Nov 9.—Having waited more
 than the allotted time for President Harrison
 to issue his Thanksgiving proclamation. Gov-
 ernor Penney today issued the following:
 Inasmuch as the gratitude for favors re-
 ceived should find due expression, I do hereby
 appoint Thursday, the 26th day of November
 as a day of public thanksgiving to Almighty
 God, to be observed by the whole people of
 Oregon in the usual appropriate manner in
 return for the blessings of peace and plenty
 which have been bestowed upon them during
 the past year.
 When asked if it were not an unusual thing
 for the governor to issue a Thanksgiving pro-
 clamiation before the president of the nation
 issues his, the governor said, jokingly, that
 Uncle Hen had no doubt been rattled by the
 events of last Tuesday, and was waiting to
 hear from New York.
The K. of L's.
 TOLEDO, O Nov 9.—Delegates to the
 fifteenth general assembly of the Knights of
 Labor arriving here in large numbers from
 all parts of the United States, Canada
 and two or three cities in Mexico. The dele-
 gates say this will be one of the most import-
 ant assemblies ever held. The finance com-
 mittee has about completed its work, and so
 far finds all the finances of the order in fine
 condition. The secretary's reports will show
 that the order has increased in membership
 over 8000 during the past year in this country
 alone, and all the local assemblies are in a
 flourishing condition.
What Whiskey Did.
 PORT JERVIS, N Y Nov 9.—A fearful
 tragedy was enacted at the home of G E David
 an aged resident of Pike county, Penn, last
 Thursday. A young farm laborer, Simon
 Field, entered David's house and fired a shot-
 gun full in his face, fatally injuring him. He
 then shot and painfully wounded David's wife
 The assassin then fled down the road, and
 meeting a son of David's, shot at him, inflict-
 ing a slight wound. Field, who was not
 arrested until Sunday, says he was drunk
 when he did the shooting.
An Infamous Deed.
 EUGENE, Or Nov 9.—R J McDonald was
 taken to Salem this morning to serve out
 a sentence of one year in the penitentiary, be-
 ing sentenced by Judge Pipes on conviction of
 the crime of obtaining money under false pre-
 tensions. He collected subscription money for
 the Oregonian without authority and appro-
 priated it to his own use.
Big Winnings.
 LONDON, Nov 9.—The 50th birthday of
 the Prince of Wales is being celebrated with
 royal enthusiasm. It is said that ever since
 early morning messages have been pouring
 into Sandringham with gifts, those from the
 German kaiser and Prince Henry alone
 amounting in value to 100,000 marks.

 WASHINGTON, Nov 9.—The cablegram
 received by Secretary Tracy from Captain
 Schley, dated Valparaiso, Chili, yesterday,
 states there is no indication of any feeling of
 hostility toward the Baltimore's officers and
 sailors at Valparaiso.
