THE LOUDEN CASE.—Louden, who was arrested yesterday on a charge of being an accessory to the murder of Henry Ingram, was given a hearing before Justice Humphrey this morning. C. W. Watts, E. A. Milner and Fred Goulet testified substantially that Louden came to Goulet's saloon in this city the night of the killing and said that a man had been killed out at Frank Ingram's by Frank, and exhibited a revolver saying, "this is the boy that did the work." They also testified that the defendant, said he asked Frank when the deed was committed if he knew who it was that he had killed, when he said he did not. He, the defendant, said he asked Frank a second time whom he had killed when he said he guessed it was Henry. Fred Goulet testified that he loaned Louden a pistol since he began working for Frank. The sheriff was directed by the district attorney to produce the two pistols which were in evidence during the trial of Frank, which he did when Goulet recognized the older of the two as the one he had loaned Louden. After addresses by counsel the court held the defendant to await the action of the grand jury without bail.

A PAYING FARM.—Here is an account of a farm that certainly paid. The Pendleton East Oregonian says that good wheat land in Umatilla county has advanced largely in value, particularly in the eastern end, where it commands \$40 and \$45 per acre, several farms being sold at that figure near Athena. An illustration comes from Gerking Flat. Two or three years ago Harvey McDonald bought the Quinn place for \$4000. He raised two crops on the land, and made enough to pay for it, getting forty bushels to the acre this season. Tuesday he sold the place to E. H. Sanders for \$8,250.

IMPORTANT FIRE MATTER.—A meeting of the Board of Fire Delegates was held last evening. Frank Dannels, of No. 1's was elected judge, and W. E. Gillett, of No. 2's and Percy Kelley, of the H & L Co. clerks for the firemen's election on Dec. 10. It was decided to only allow active members to vote at the election, and to publish a list of all suspended members during the past two years. Exempt members will also be refused the privilege of voting. It is intended to arrange the partment laws and publish them in a pamphlet form.

A LIVE ANDERSON.—Wheat is itself again, and today we take pleasure in quoting it at 86 1/2 cents, with a promising outlook. The foreign market shows very healthy signs, and the prospect is good for still higher. The Oregonian gives the San Francisco market as \$1.82 1/2 per cental, equal to 89 cents per bushel in Albany; but a local dealer says his advisers are for \$1.80, which should make the Albany market 88 cents, according to the usual style of calculating. Oats also show up better and are quoted at 36 1/2 cents. At Salem wheat is only placed at 82 1/2 cents.

NEED ENEMIES.—The Astorian says "there are men in the world of so little importance that they have no enemies. The Astorian should have added; and these are the men so often mentioned as suitable candidates for office, because they are so popular. The popular man is usually the fellow who is afraid to speak because he will offend some one, and who lacks force because he fears it." This makes us feel quite important.

ELECTION BOOTHS.—The contract for furnishing election booths for Linn county has been let to Glass & Prudhomme, of Portland. They will be made by the Grant's Pass Sugar Pine & Lumber Co. with whom the above firm has a contract and will cost Linn county about \$400 in all. The Australian system will not be observed in the coming city election, though it is as necessary in city elections as any. Glass & Prudhomme also have the contract for Lane county.

OFFICIAL FOOD TESTS.

The United States and Canadian Governments Analyze the Baking Powders.

Comparative Strength and Purity of the Different Brands Officially Determined.

Prof. Haines, Consulting Chemist of the Chicago Board of Health, Gives His Opinion.

The public is always responsive to suggestions about the food it eats. 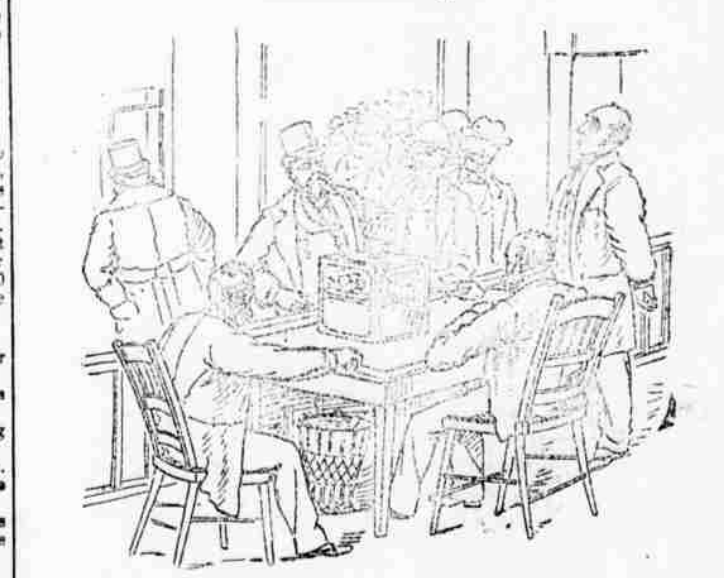
