**TELEGRAPHIC NEWS**

**A Free Bridge.**  
PORTLAND, Nov 11.—The Madison-street bridge was formally turned over to the city shortly after midnight last night. After the council adjourned the free-bridge committee met in the council chamber with resident David Goodsell, of the Columbia street Bridge Company, which owns the Madison street bridge, and President George W Brown, of the Mount Tabor Street Railroad Company, which operates the railway lines across the bridge, and the contract was signed, acknowledged, sealed and locked in the city safe. Immediately the bridge company withdrew its toll collectors. The amount the committee paid for the bridge was \$142,500, which is \$2500 less than the limit placed by the council.

**An Exciting Adventure.**  
EUGENE, Or Nov 11.—One of the most dangerous and exciting adventures ever reported here was experienced this morning on the McKenzie river. Julius Sidel, cook for the logging camp of J C Goodall, was going to the camp in a boat just above J C Davis' place, when, by some means, the boat overturned. He was noticed by one of the workmen hanging to the boat and rapidly approaching a drift of this swift running stream. The man gave the alarm, and his companions made rapidly for the drift. By the time they reached the place the waters had carried the man and boat into it. One of them managed to catch him by the hair and hold his head out of the water while the others pried the heavy boat from off his body and rescued him.

**A Strange Suicide.**  
ASTORIA, Or Nov 11.—Sottlers in from N-halem today bring news of a strange suicide last Thursday on Humbug creek, a small tributary of the Nehalem river. Thomas Nelson, a Swedish settler, returned to his home about 6 o'clock in the evening, and his wife requested him to hold the baby. He refused, and ordered her to get some supper for him. Sharp words were exchanged, and in a moment Mrs Nelson rushed for the door and ran toward the creek followed by her children and afterwards by her husband. On reaching the stream she threw herself into the water and was drowned right in the presence of her husband, who, apparently, was unable to help her.

**The South American.**  
NEW YORK, Nov 11.—The correspondent of the Herald at Valparaiso sends the following dispatch: It is reported tonight that a number of members of the Brazilian congress, which Dictator Fonseca recently dissolved, have sought an asylum in the different foreign legations in Rio Janeiro, Uruguay has become alarmed at the state of affairs in Brazil and has massed troops along the frontier line of that country. I am just in the receipt of a dispatch from Buenos Ayres, which states on the night of November 9 the revolt was begun in Rio Grande do Sul, and spread rapidly. At last accounts a greater part of the state was occupied by the rebels.

**Iowa Election Returns.**  
DES MOINES, Nov 11.—The state registrar has complete returns tonight from all the counties in the state. The total vote for governor was 420,214, the largest vote ever cast in the state. The whole democratic ticket is elected. Boies' plurality for governor is 7816. This is the highest on the ticket, except Dey, for railroad commissioner, whose plurality is 10,375.
