A PUBLIC KINDERGARTEN.—An effort is being made to establish a kindergarten in our public schools. A petition to that effect is being generally signed. An entertainment will be given on Wednesday afternoon by Mrs. Tatham's kindergarten class, in order to further the matter more forcibly before the citizens. The movement is a good one. The kindergarten is the proper introduction to school life. It lays the foundation for the best education. It, through much effort, advances the child so that when he enters the other departments he is ready for the work. Mrs. Tatham, who is teaching a successful class, is a master of the Froebel system, and probably has no superior in Oregon, even among the best in Portland. Her department under her charge would be a success and would do much to advance the educational interests of the little ones in Albany, as well as in the county, for it is proposed, if introduced in the schools to complete an arrangement by which the teachers of the county generally may receive instructions as to their regular work in their primary classes. In all large cities the kindergarten is receiving the recognition it deserves, and it is safe to predict that Albany will not be behind the times.

A BIG CATHEDRAL.—Archbishop Gross is planning for building a Catholic cathedral on the property recently purchased by him in Portland, bounded by Broadway, Sixteenth, D and C, which is \$85,000. The new building will be the largest church on the Pacific coast, extending to present plans, it will be 200 feet long and 100 feet wide, with a 200 foot long and fifty feet wide, with archepiscopal residence in the rear.
