

SIGNIFICANT CONCESSION.

For some years the New York World has urged pretty strenuous opposition to Grover Cleveland and the claims which his friends urge in his behalf for the presidency. But the World is, in the best sense of that word, a newspaper. It publishes all sides of all questions while arguing its own views vigorously. Under dates of November 12th and 13th it publishes brief extracts from democratic papers all over the country, in which these papers with singularly great unanimity call upon Mr Cleveland to become democracy's standard bearer in the next presidential campaign. The World with its usual fidelity to truth heads these extracts with the following editorial remark: "Cleveland the favorite. The Democratic and Independent press, east, west, north and south, favors Cleveland as the candidate in 1892." This is true, as has been observed by every one who has had access to the democratic papers of the country. The following are some of those from which the World makes extracts: Boston Herald, Kansas City Times, Savannah (Ga.) News, Natchez (Miss.) Democrat, Newburyport (Mass.) Herald, St Paul Globe, Albany Argus, Richmond State, Manchester (N H) Union, Baltimore Sun, Charleston (S C) News and Courier, New Haven Register, Montgomery Register, Rochester (Ja.) Herald, Philadelphia Times, Pittsburg Post, Richmond Times, Harpers Weekly, Kansas City Star, Salt Lake Times, Omaha World-Herald and many others. The World publishes the following editorial as expressive of a very feeble opposition to the strong current setting in in favor of Mr Cleveland. The friends of Mr Cleveland will see in the objection urged by the World a very frivolous excuse:

The extracts reprinted in the World from the democratic and independent news papers make it very clear that the current of public opinion as reflected in the press is setting strongly in favor of Mr Cleveland's nomination for the presidency. There can be no doubt as to the hold which the ex-president has upon the confidence of the people. The enthusiasm which his presence excited in democratic meetings during the late campaign and the weight given to his utterances testified to a very substantial sort of popularity. Yet, conceding that Mr Cleveland can be nominated and elected, is that the end of the question for 1892? A political party which wishes to impress its policy upon the country and to give effect to its principles must look ahead. Long views are as essential to good politics as to wise diplomacy or sagacious war. The democratic victory in 1884, won against terrible odds and at a time when it seemed doubtful if the republican party could be dislodged from power for another decade, was virtually frittered by the failure of President Cleveland to be re-elected. If Mr Cleveland should be elected next year would it be possible or prudent to re-nominate him in 1896, in view of the unwritten law against a third term president? Would not a change of leaders then imperil success? Are not these questions worth considering?

WOULD FEEL JOYFUL.

Cleveland and Penoyer would sound well, and republicans would feel as joyful in defeating them as any two who could be named. —Mountaineer. Of course you would feel joyful. But and it, maybe it would be about just like it was when David, the banker, was pitted against Penoyer, the Peculiar, in 1890 when the latter knocked the former out to the tune of over 5000. Yes, indeed, the republican brethren sought to make the occasions, when Penoyer ran against Cornelius, and again when he ran against David, ones that would make them feel joyful, but somehow they were not in it. Men and brethren, Penoyer will not be on the ticket with Cleveland. Gray or Boies will be there but our Penoyer will be called up higher. Already the people, mind you now the People! both republicans and democrats are beginning to say that Penoyer is to fill the seat now occupied by the senior senator from Oregon. And how wondrously it would be filled.

TARIFF REFORM IN MASSACHUSETTS

The tariff reformers re-elected Governor Russell, in the opinion of the Boston Transcript (rep), which says: Among the causes which operated very materially to swell Mr Russell's vote was the popular aversion to the McKinley bill. This exhibited itself notably at manufacturing centers. Massachusetts still remembers how her interests were neglected that other states might reap an advantage, most of the leaders in this campaign having tamely submitted in congress and elsewhere to this sacrifice. It doesn't require a very keen observer to see that Massachusetts is not a high tariff state at this time, and the republicans should reform their leadership so as to recognize the changed condition of public sentiment. They cannot begin too soon, in view of the action that the next house will probably take respecting free raw materials.

Statistics received by the Bureau of American Republic show a growth in the population of the Argentine Republic since 1861 from 1,350,000 to 4,000,000, and in the number of acres under cultivation from 490,000 to 7,000,000. In 1861 the only railroad was Buenos Ayres to Merio, a distance of 18 miles. Over 5000 miles of railroad are now open to traffic, and 6000 more in course of construction. The public debt has increased from \$17,000,000 to \$401,000,000, exclusive of cedulas and the paper currency, which raise it to \$613,000,000.

ILLITERACY AND DRUNKENNESS

As to the question of illiteracy and temperance: Go into any liquor saloon for an hour and ask each man who comes in to read a paragraph from a paper, and see how few there are who cannot do it. Observe the most prosperous saloons in any town, and the people who support them. Get right down to the facts, and then there will be very little talk about the illiterates being the backbone of the liquor traffic. The states which have been wont to give very heavy republican majorities are usually credited by the party organs with a superabundance of education and intelligence, and the south is sneered at as containing an abundant percentage of illiterate people, white and black.
