

KEEN CONCEPTION.

Just before the late election the *Oregonian* said:

"It is not too much to say that the defeat of McKinley in Ohio would compel complete shifting of republican ground upon the tariff question."

Almost exactly on the same date Grover Cleveland was addressing a vast concourse of democrats gathered in and around the heart of Brooklyn, when he made the following remark that, as an incident, is remarkable on account of the exact harmony between what the *Oregonian* said and what the ex-president said:

"The party we oppose rests upon no fundamental principle, sustains a precarious existence upon distorted sentiment, and depends for success upon the varying currents of selfish interests and popular misconception."

As the *Oregonian* viewed it the simple defeat of McKinley would have been sufficient reason for the republican party to completely shift its ground on the tariff question. This means that if the party saw defeat coming to it in the next presidential election an account of its extreme protection, then in order for it to win success the party should shift its ground and take the free trade side of the question.

Have political opinions no greater substantiality than to be traded and bartered for a few loaves and fishes? The *Oregonian* thinks not. There was a time, still fresh in the minds of nearly all Oregonians, when that was the most ardent, most powerful, as well as candid and honest, promoter of the doctrine of "free trade" of any paper on the coast. No one who read the tariff articles, promulgative of free trade, that appeared in that paper from 1881 to 1886 could for a moment doubt the sincerity of its editor. He was writing then for the public good as his only consideration. Every one remembers how suddenly that paper completely shifted its ground upon the occasion of a visit made to Portland by an authorized agent of the Tariff League, an organization supported by the protected nabobs of the east. How keen was the perception of the ex-president when he spoke of a party represented by such organs as the *Oregonian* as one that "depends for success upon the varying current of selfish interests and popular misconception." No wonder the ex-president characterized the party as one that "rests upon no fundamental principle" when one of its chief spokesmen would advise a change of political sentiment upon so vital a question as the tariff upon the happening of so unimportant an event as the defeat of McKinley would have been. Are the principles of government and the rights of the people to be bartered away for a few offices? Let sensible people answer.

GIVES IT UP

The New York *World* has been unfriendly to Mr. Cleveland ever since the second year of his term as president. All the while it has been insisting that he was not the favorite of the people of his party. Since the late election there has been such a unanimous crystallization of public sentiment in his favor that the *World* is led to say:

"Whether any candidate from the 'broad-shouldered' west would be as strong in the three northern states which it is essential that the democrats shall carry, and which with the south should give them just the 223 electoral votes necessary to succeed—New York, New Jersey and Indiana—is a question for the national convention next year to consider."

The proceedings of the new congress may change the conditions, but at the present time all the indications point strongly to the nomination and election of Mr. Cleveland."

The result in Ohio is not to be wondered at when it is stated on as good authority as Governor Campbell himself that the campaign was conducted by the democracy with empty coffers, while the republican campaign funds were exceedingly large, owing to unprecedented assessments on manufacturers and office-holders. The only thing to be wondered at is that political virtue survives to the extent it does in the democratic party when confronted with all the power and influence of the moneyed aristocracy, in addition to the close-connection organization of the republican party and the machinations of the dispensers of government patronage. —*Jacksonville Times*.

It is pointed out that the turndown collar is a power in Massachusetts, for William E. Russell, the successful candidate for governor this year and last, wears it, as did his predecessor in the gubernatorial chair. Fashion will consider that these were cases where the end justified the means. Mr. Fassett, by the way, started in with a standing collar of the Platt brand, and the people turned it down for him.

John G. Houk, republican, was elected to congress the other day in the Knoxville, Tennessee district, over J. C. Williams democrat, by 8000 majority. The usual majority is from 9000 to 13,000. The vacancy was caused by the death of Houk's father.

READY FOR OPEN REVOLT.

What's this we see now? A republican dispatch from Washington City to the republican Pioneer Press of St. Paul, which scrapes the bogus shine off the tin fraud in most brutal fashion. "All republicans who can see opportunities for success," it says, "in the present divided condition of the party, are anxious that an actual, tangible tin plate factory should be started. They feel that one must be in operation before the next campaign is far advanced."

It then goes on to say that "the tin plate clause in the McKinley tariff bill is now its fatal defect. It will take several tin plate establishments to make McKinley president, and unless they are established and in full blast before the next national convention, he might as well be eliminated from the list of possibilities. It would be very easy for the capitalists to start such an industry if it is profitable in this country."

From the bottom of his cavernous despair the writer then waits forth that "It might also be well for ex-Senator Moody's friends to turn out some block tin in the Black Hills. Moody and Pettigrew got the raw material protected by amending the bill in the senate, and it is about time that raw tin is displayed."

But the most instructive clause in this choice republican circular from national headquarters is the following:

Several republicans here are rather nervous about the tin industry, and unless there is some valid and substantial action taken to reap the benefit of protection they may aid or take the initiative in having that clause of the law canceled.

This tin disgust has gone so far, then that "leading republicans" themselves, not the unsanctified, unbelieving democrats, think 'most seriously' of ending the farce by clubbing tin protection over the head. With these opinions anchored in the minds of republican legislators the democratic tariff reformer can find plenty of good soil for his doctrine when congress meets. This one paragraph gives the lie direct to all the campaign fusian of the past three months and writes the blatant tin soldiers down as Falstaffian braggarts. —*Spokane Chronicle*.
