

SHODDY CHEAPNESS

The Herald tells of some eastern manufacturer of underwear who, in a circular letter, says: "My prices for next spring are from ten to fifteen per cent less than heretofore. Why? My increased production of those goods allows me to make them at a less expense in manufacture."

The Herald says: "This is exactly the situation and just what the new law contemplated." This would be the "situation" if the "manufacturer" told the truth, but he does not. There are two facts that show why this "manufacturer" of underwear might place his products on the markets at lower figures than heretofore. The first is that his raw material—cotton, wool, and shoddy—cost him less than heretofore. Wool, under the McKinley law, has been selling at a less figure than before its passage, just as the Home Market Club of Boston, (a protection organization,) said it would, because, as it said, the tariff rates on wool and woolen goods were so skillfully adjusted as to make wool cheaper. Of course this is one of the reasons why this "manufacturer" can sell cheaper than heretofore. Any one, though a wayfarer man, can grasp this logical truth. The second and most potent reason why this "manufacturer" can sell cheaper than heretofore is, that manufacturers of underwear and woolen goods are using more shoddy than ever before known. An expert dealer in woolen goods says that the woolen markets are more fully glutted with pretended woolen goods than ever before. Every man in the country knows this to be so. All-wool goods are often difficult to find, and so expert and skillful have manufacturers become that no one, unless he be an expert, can tell whether a piece of cloth is all wool or not. All wool goods are fully as high as before the passage of the McKinley bill. Shoddy goods, of course, are cheap.

The McKinley scheme of securing protection for republican states and free trade for the democratic states is going to be, in a kind of left handed way, like bread cast upon the waters. People who are now having a taste of the blessed sweetness of "free trade" in sugar, are beginning to ask if "free trade" in sugar is such a blessedly sweet thing, why not have some more "free trade" such as free trade in lumber, salt, binding twine, coal, jute sacks for grain, etc. No doubt our republican friends who were so professedly anxious last year to legislate the tariff for the farmer, will have an opportunity during the next congress to vote for "free trade" in the above articles. Democrats in the next house will put republicans to the test on the matter of materially reducing the duty, or placing on the free list the above articles. Putting the four articles above named on the free list would be for greater benefit to the farmers than all the features of the McKinley law.

The hour product of the Minneapolis Mills for the week ending Oct. 31 was the largest ever made, being 205,930 barrels, against 205,720 barrels the week before. The 21 mills are making about 35,000 barrels every 24 hours. The direct exports of 97,700 barrels were also the largest ever made in a week, the preceding week being 86,590 barrels.

Major Monteith, counsel for Senator Quay, has entered a civil suit for libel against the Pittsburg Post for publishing the Bardsley certificate of deposit and commenting editorially thereon. Damages are laid at \$100,000.

The new transatlantic steamers which are building by the Cunard Line are to maintain a sea speed of 21 knots per hour. An offer of an English company guaranteed 22½ knots per hour, but was refused, owing to the scanty space offered for first cabin passengers.

It is expected that within a year electricity generated by Niagara Falls will be transmitted from Niagara to Buffalo to the extent of 20,000-horse power, and it is expected to take the place of much of the steam power in that city.

No, the governor will not be asked to be a candidate, but it is highly probable that when the people have snatched the office from the hands of plutocrats and monopolists that they will ask him to become a public servant in the highest legislative body in the world.
