A RECIPROCITY DILEMMA.

Under the so-called "reciprocity" clause of the McKinley tariff act the president will have authority on the 1st of January to impose duties on hides, coffee and sugar from the Argentine Republic, Uruguay, Mexico, Venezuela and all other countries that have not responded to our demand for a reduction of their tariff exactions upon American goods.

Will Mr Harrison do this? His administration has used the power as a threat and has in that way extorted treaties of so-called reciprocity in which the other countries concerned have made large concessions to us in return for our promise not to reimpose these duties upon their products, and our implied promise to put those countries at advantage by reimposing duties on the products of countries that refused to make similar concessions.

Is Mr Harrison to fulfill the implied promise? Or have we resorted to deception and sharp practice as a means of securing the reciprocity treaties? The price we promised to pay for the concessions made to us in those treaties was the return concessions of forbearance, so far as they were concerned, from a reimposition of duties which we were to enforce against other countries. Having got the goods are we now going to withhold the price?

It is the world's conviction that the president will not exercise his power. He will not venture to reimpose duties on sugar, hides or coffee, because if he did his party would be swept out of existence as by a cyclone at the next election. But why was the power conferred upon him by the McKinley bill if its use was never intended? Was that, too, a mere trick for the catching of votes? Is the whole reciprocity scheme a fetch?—New York World.

RUSSIAN SITUATION.

The distress in Russia this year on account of crop failures is regarded with most serious apprehension by all well informed as regards Russian affairs. The country is the most despotic in Europe, one of a class of governments common enough all over the continent two years ago. But the people of all Europe have been growing in intelligence. Nowhere except in Russia are they subjected to the tyranny that was everywhere common a century ago. France exalted the wrongs of centuries in a short reign of terror that appalled the world. Other countries have secured constitutional government by milder methods. Russia alone suffers from the same despotism its people endured for ages past. But its people, slowly, it is true, have been growing more intelligent, showing the illumination common to humanity. It has only served to make them more discontented. The watchword of the progressive party is *Nihilism*—the destruction of all existing order and civilization and beginning everything anew. The misery of widespread famine may light the torch to a blaze more terrible than any Europe has yet seen.

Bynum of Indiana has withdrawn as a candidate for the speakership in favor of Mills of Texas. He says:

"I never pressed my candidacy, and consented only to the use of my name until it became evident the contest was narrowed down between Mills and Crisp. I shall heartily support Mills. While all of the candidates are strong tariff reformers, none so prominently represents the position of the party on this question as Mills. He is known to the people as a prominent figure in the house on this question, and his defeat would, in a great measure, be accepted as an abandonment of the issue. Tariff is the issue upon which we must aim in 1892, and there should be no semblance of wavering or halting at this critical period. Unless the party stands firmly and aggressively in favor of this issue, the farmers of the northwest, who gave us such sweeping victories in 1890, will become discouraged, and may abandon a hope of success through the organizations of our party."

Three children were recently added to the family of Mr and Mrs Caleb Hopkins of New Jersey—two girls and a boy. Great interest in the event has been shown in the neighborhood, and hundreds of people have visited the mother and her babies at their home in Archertown during the past ten days.

The little house was filled with interested spectators on the occasion of the christening last week, when the name of Grover Cleveland Hopkins was conferred upon the boy, and the girls were named respectively Frances Cleveland Hopkins and Ruth Cleveland Hopkins.

The babies are bright and appear to be in excellent health.

Harper's Weekly, that gave such strong support to Fassett, the republican candidate for governor of New York at the late election, speaking of the elections upon the presidential contest next year says:

"Despite the Tammany victory in New York, there are in the whole democratic prospect signs of promise. But in the republican prospect they are not visible."

Congressman William H Hatch has formally announced himself to be a candidate for the speakership of the House of Representatives. He has the support of the democratic state committee, the executive committee of the Missouri branch of the national democratic clubs, all but one member of the Missouri congressional delegation and the leading democrats of the state.
