THE KINDERGARTEN ENTERTAINMENT.

The opera house was crowded yesterday afternoon on the occasion of the Froebel kindergarten entertainment. The first part of the program, as published, was carried out, and contained many pleasing features, displaying in a marked manner the capacities of the smallest children when properly instructed. Some of the pieces were very bright, and certainly proved a thanksgiving offering of merit. The audience was much pleased with the entertainment, the general impression being a very favorable one for the kindergarten system. Owing to an unavoidable delay in beginning the exercises it was found necessary to omit the second part of the program, consisting of addresses on the subject, a fact greatly regretted. It is the intention of holding another entertainment at an early date in order to complete the program, when new features will be added, among others a paper by Mrs. Tatham.

PROHIBITION.—John Lloyd Thomas, secretary of the national prohibition committee delivered an address at the W. C. T. U. hall last evening to a small audience. Mr. Thomas is sent out to reorganize the prohibition party in this state. He is a very pleasant and logical speaker and at the close organized a club of 27 members. We understand that ladies and young ladies and gentlemen (non voters) are taken into these clubs. Mr. Thomas arranged in terse language that system of legislation that has, in the last 25 years, resulted in making 8,000 millionaires who own 70 per cent of the wealth of the country. He made the mistake, however, of blaming the democrats equally with the republicans for this system of legislation. He should bear in mind that during the last 25 years the democrats have not had legislative control of the government, and hence could not be held responsible for it.

BEING TRIED.—The Observer of Layetteville, N. C., gives an account of the opening proceedings of the trial of McDougall, arrested for murder at Spicet in this county by sheriff Scott and taken back by a North Carolina sheriff. It seems to have attracted great interest. Four leading lawyers appeared for the prosecution and six prominent attorneys for the defendant. 150 to 200 witnesses have been subpoenaed. The case promises to become one of the celebrated ones of that state. The next Observer will probably give the verdict, when the DEMOCRAT will impart it to its readers, many of whom are interested in knowing the result.

The Willamette is four feet above low water at this city, a fine navigation stage.

NO MORE FREE RIDES.—A Chicago dispatch says: "The annual agreement of Western lines to abolish all free transportation has assumed such shape as to make it certain that the plan will be given a trial. Almost every Western road has agreed to join the movement, and prior to the organization meeting a pledge is being circulated for signatures. The pledge embodies what will be the agreement and in brief binds each road to refrain from giving any one transportation except for value received." That will not affect the newspapers as some may surmise. They pay for their rides in hard-ads. It will "get to the neck" though of state officials and such. Notwithstanding the present strict laws, over one-tenth of the people ride on passes, right in Oregon.

THE MILL READY.—The big ten stamp mill of the Albany Mining and Milling Company has been set up, and is ready to run. It was intended to start it a day or two ago, but the dump of ore broke down, delaying work for a few days. The mill will probably start tomorrow. The result will be watched with great interest, as it will be of great importance to the Willamette valley generally. The universally good assays made can leave no doubt as to the outcome. Should the result anticipated occur the Santiam Mines will attract general attention on the coast.

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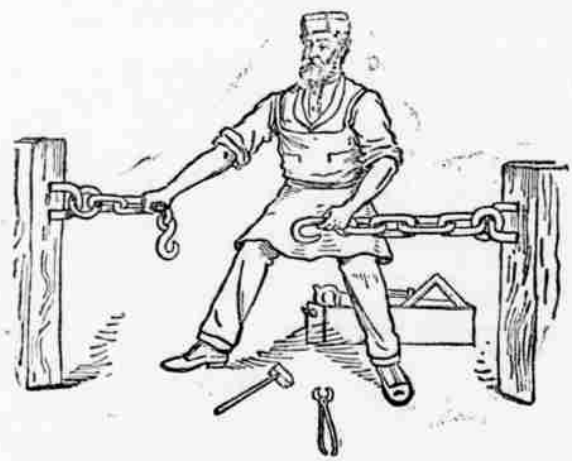
