

"SUPPORTIONS" NOT SUFFICIENT.

The Oregonian in attempting to show that democrats in New York are attempting to secure a majority in the senate of that state by unfair means says:

After election the senate was supposed to stand republican 17, democrats 15, and republican independent 1. One republican is counted out and another pronounced ineligible, and one democrat has died. This will make the senate a tie, 16 to 16, if the independent vote with the republicans. The democratic lieutenant governor will have the casting vote, and Tammany can do what it may please with the legislature.

But that paper should know that "supportions" as to the election of senators do not count. As proof of this, we have only to refer to the fact that if the republicans were "supposed" to have 17 members, democrats 15, and independents one, then that body would be composed of 33 members, but the truth is, it has but 32. Another important fact is that it is not true that a democratic senator has died since the election, but on the contrary a republican whom the republicans claimed to have elected senator died, but when the full returns were canvassed it was found that he was not elected but that his opponent was. There are other misstatements in that paper's review of the situation in New York, but the above are sufficient to show that it shows nothing about the facts in the case. It is only the cry of "stop thief" on the part of the Oregonian to protest that the democrats want to secure the legislature in order to gerrymander the state for congressional and legislative purposes. Had the republican legislatures of that state at any time during the last six or eight years performed their sworn duty to take a census and redistrict that state as by the constitution required there would be no room or cause for this cry of gerrymandering. The outrageous way in which that party has the state gerrymandered is sufficient to keep the mouths of all decent republicans closed as touching the matter of redistricting. In northern counties of that state 5000 population are equal to ten and twelve thousand in New York and Brooklyn.

A CENTURY.

In his annual report to the secretary of the navy, Commodore Dewey, chief of the bureau of equipment, summarizes the work of his bureau during the year as follows: "During the past fiscal year, fifty-three vessels have been either wholly or partly equipped under this bureau at an expenditure for labor and material of \$664,239." Commodore Dewey encloses the reports of the superintendents of the naval observatory and nautical almanac office and naval inspector of electric lighting. The superintendent of observatory says: "April 15, 1893, a total solar eclipse occurs under circumstances so favorable that its observation is extremely desirable. The central line of shadow sweeps across South America, the Atlantic ocean, and Northern Africa, and the duration of totality is four minutes forty-two seconds, near Cereia, Brazil, and four minutes ten seconds, near Bathurst, Senegambia. Many of the most important questions relating to the constitution of the sun can be studied only during total eclipses, and as the whole time available for that purpose is only about three hours in a century, the necessity for utilizing every available eclipse is evident, if we are ever to comprehend that wonder on which the very existence of the human race depends." He hopes means may be provided for the sending of at least one party to Cereia, and, if possible, another to Bathurst.

Democrats who set it down as settled that Cleveland or Hill will be nominated for the presidency should bear in mind that the party has other great leaders. Gorman for instance is a born leader in great emergencies. The democrats owe him a debt of lasting gratitude for the inestimable service he rendered the country last congress in defeating the infamous force bill. It should be an inexpressible pleasure for any to have the privilege of voting for such a man.

The mere fact that one political party, instead of the other, has control of the offices of the general government, is a matter of no importance to the general public. But the difference in the policy of the two parties may, and often is, of vital importance. It is the difference in the tariff policy of the two parties that makes it so essential to turn the republicans out.

The death of Charles Barnett, a farmer aged 40 years, living about four miles south of Chadron, Neb., is the end of a chapter of fatalities which is out of the usual run. Ten weeks ago the Barnett family numbered eight people. They were Charles and his wife and five children and Miss Martha Barnett, his sister. One after another of these have all died, and today not a soul remains of the family. The youngest, a child, was the first to be taken. Diphtheria, in a malignant form, attacked the babe, and it died within two days, followed by the next child with the same disease one day later. The other children were attacked, but all recovered with the exception of the eldest, who was slow in convalescing. He took cold just when it was thought he was getting well, and died. The next day one of the remaining children fell from the top of the barn, and when found its neck was broken. On returning from the funeral the team ran away and threw Mrs. Barnett and her sister-in-law from the wagon killing the latter instantly and inflicting such injuries on the former that she died three days later. Two weeks ago the remaining child was trying to light a fire, when her clothing caught fire and she was so badly burned that she died. A week ago Barnett was working in his stable, when he received a kick from one of his horses, from the effect of which he died the next day, his death completing the round of fatalities and finishing putting the family out of existence. He had no known relatives. The farm reverts to the state unless there can be found some other members of the family.

A man in Skowhegan, Me., has lately had the privilege of visiting an oak tree in the town of Ripley which grew from an acorn that he planted there 75 years ago. The trunk is nine feet in circumference, and the branches extend over a space 76 across.

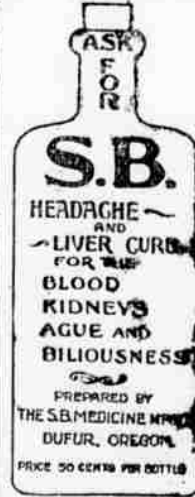
