A DISASTROUS FIRE.

The Fire Flend Deals Seis a Heavy Blow.

This morning at 12:55 o'clock fire was discovered in the electric light works at Seis, having started in some manner from the dynamo. These works, together with the flour works, are situated adjoining the flouring mill of E. Goin. Great excitement at once prevailed, and every effort possible was made to extinguish the flames; but the water works worked poorly at first and not at all after a while, and little could be done with so large a structure enveloped in flames. The entire building was burned, together with 15,000 bushels of wheat. This included the water works and electric light plant. It was with difficulty that several adjoining buildings were saved. The flouring mill and water works were valued at \$15,000, electric light plant, \$2,500; wheat at 85 cents, \$13,200. Total, \$30,700. On this there was insurance of \$10,000 on the mill, the wheat and electric light plant not being insured. Mr. Goin owned 5,000 bushels of the wheat, the farmers 10,000 bushels. The insurance was carried as follows: Guardian and Lyon, of which Mr. Goin was local agent, W. H. Raymond, special agent, \$8,500; Farmers and Merchants, of Albany, \$1,500. The loss is not only a heavy one to Mr. Goin, Seis's most enterprising citizen, but as well to the whole community. If obliged to meet his present obligations it would leave him without much if anything.

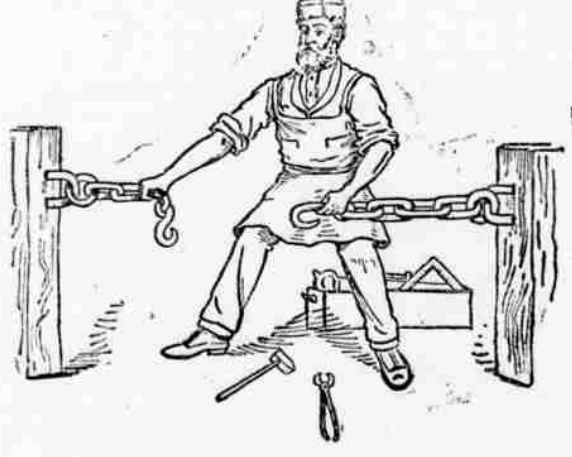
