RESISTANCE TO FRAUD.

The legislature of 1892 is to be democratic because the people have voted to make it so. In certain close districts there have been attempts to change this result by fraud, but they have been baffled by democratic watchfulness and by insistence upon the enforcement of law.

The determination to seat an ineligible man in the senate in defiance of an express constitutional provision has been opposed in legal ways, as it must be if the constitution is to remain the supreme law of the land.
