Harry Gottschalk, who was arrested in Portland Wednesday morning on a charge of stealing valuable property from his sister-in-law, Mrs Marie Davis, was before Judge Jewett today and discharged. The arrest caused considerable excitement in this city, and the prisoner's wife entered Attorney Winton's office, seized important papers connected with the case and ran down stairs before she could be stopped.

FROM THE MINES.—Mr Peter Wilson, who has been assisting in putting up the new ten stamp mill in the Santiam mines came to Albany last evening, accompanied by Mr Stevens and another employe of the company. The mill was started running with a large pile of ore on the dump Thursday evening, and went ahead in fine shape and in a manner to indicate that it will do good work. There is considerable snow in the mines, and on that account it is very doubtful whether the mill can be kept running, but it will be run right along if possible.

BOY NIMROD.—Henry Benjamin of near Gervais, who is not yet fourteen years old, on several occasions has made a better record at the various shooting matches in this section than any one, old or young. In 1888, when only nine years old, he killed 163 birds such as are used for food, in the space of about eight months. These were all killed at odd times when he could spare time from his work to engage in a little sport. For this and other fine shooting he received a medal from Oakland, California, of which he is very proud and prizes very highly. At the shooting match here a few days ago, he carried away more turkeys than any one there, beating all of the best shots present and there were several of them. There were three ties between him and Charley Jones, said to be one of the best shots on this prairie. These ties were all shot off and Henry won them all.—Star.

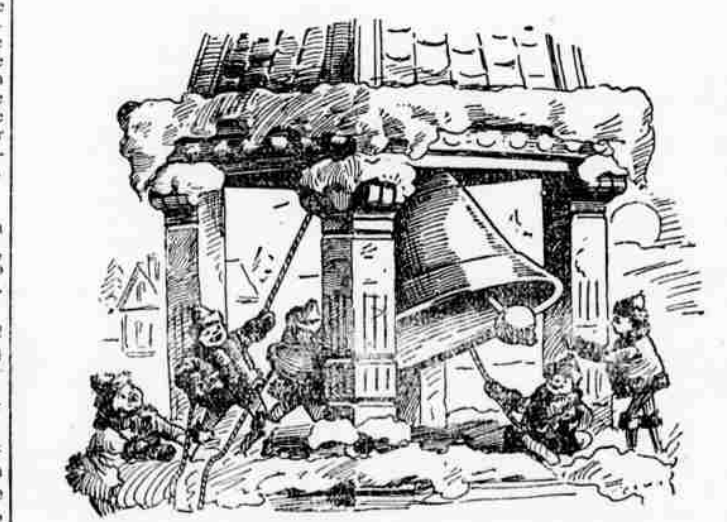
