MISCELLANEOUS

The Salem Statesman gets off a good joke on Salem's live and popular mayor, Peter D'Arcy. It publishes the pictures of the mayors of London, New York and Salem, under the head: "Which is the best looking."

Mrs Francesca Zintek has sued the Stimson Mill company, of Ballard, Wash, for \$30,000 damages, for the death of her husband, who was killed by falling lumber last May. It is alleged that the lumber was piled loosely and without cross pieces, and that this negligence on the part of the company precipitated the accident. Men are very valuable after they are dead.

Here is a view taken of our heavy rains that is worth considering: "The excessive rainfall, the special feature of Oregon weather, has an admonition we should not forget. Colorado and California are hungry for rain and the rainmaker is abroad in the land. The peculiar forest tree of Oregon is the best rainmaker, and when we destroy it it will cost as much as the timber produced and more to build canals and irrigating ditches. Now is the time of abundant timber and fertilizing rains. The time of scarcity will come if a wise public economy does not provide against it."

Here is an item from the Sunday Welcome of Portland, that should be read by the Tacoma ministers and others who want to keep Francis Murphy away because he has peculiar notions in reference to prohibition and high license: "We miss a great many once familiar faces," a saloon keeper said the other day. "There is no doubt out that the Murphy lectures weaned several men from their cups, and in a great many instances families will be made happy by the abstinence of the husband and father from the use of intoxicants. For one I hope that these men will keep their pledges. I shall never tempt one of them. Murphy's work here has accomplished much good. I sell liquor as a living, but I have no desire to make sots of my patrons."

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Senator Plumb Dead.
WASHINGTON, Dec 20.—"Oh, my God my head!" and Senator Preston B Plumb, who, as representative of the state of Kansas in the United States senate since 1876, has occupied a prominent place in the councils of the republican party, a few minutes, fell unconscious, never to regain knowledge of what was going on around him. It was 6:45 this morning when he uttered the above exclamation. Little more than five hours later the broad-framed and powerful-looking man was stretched out dead in his modest apartments in Fourteenth street.

An Austrian Duel.
BUDA PESTH, Dec 16.—Baron Fajervary, lately minister of national defense of the Hungarian cabinet, and Her Ugruon, member of the diet, fought a duel today. They fired two shots with pistols without effect, then dropped the firearms in disgust, and continued the duel with swords. Both were wounded in the arm and the Baron had an ear cut. The duel was the result of an attack made by Ugruon upon the Baron in a speech.

A Woman Did It.
NEW YORK, Dec 20.—The Herald's Valparaiso cable says: It now appears that the greater number of the letters which have been appearing in the London Times, displaying so bitter a tone toward the United States government and its representatives, were written by a woman and not by boastful Thompson. Their real author, it seems was Lady Jordan, wife of Deputy Jordan at Santiago, and were forwarded to Lisbon, whence they were sent to the Times.

Five to Five.
SAN FRANCISCO, Dec 20.—The Portland and San Jose teams are now even in the coast championship series, each team having won five games. Today's contest almost resulted in another shutout for the Californians, and but for Patton's error and Fanning's wildness in the eighth inning, they would not have scored a run. The weather was bitterly cold at the grounds and only 3000 attended, being the smallest Sunday audience in this city this year.

Severe Discipline.
NEWPORT, R I, Dec 19.—The 150 apprentice boys at the training station at Coaster harbor island refused to scrub hammock because the water was icy and the air freezing and their health would have been endangered. Lieutenant Commander Lyons, in the absence of Captain Bruce, called out the marines, who with fixed bayonets forced the boys to scrub the hammocks.

A Common Accident.
PAWNEE CITY, Neb Dec 30.—A L Ferguson, a farmer, started for town this morning with his wife and baby. While trying to cross the railroad track the wagon was struck by a train, wedged on the pilot and carried some distance. When the train stopped, Mr and Mrs Ferguson were found to be dead and the baby fatally injured.
