A GOOD EXAMPLE FOR BOYS.—About twenty-one years ago there passed through Albany a strange lad, about fifteen years of age. Although penniless, he was on his way from Eastern Oregon to college. His slouch hat, thread-bare coat, and worn out boots, gave the boy an appearance that was anything but attractive. He was next seen with a knapsack and blankets on his back plodding his way through the mud of a back street in Corvallis. He next figures as a student and janitor in college. He graduated step by step, rising from one position to another. The lad grew into a thoroughly rounded manhood, whose services rank among the first in his profession. We have reference to Prof. J. B. Horner, who will next Monday step into an important position in the Oregon Agricultural college.

DELAYED TRAINS.—All of the trains have been delayed today. A washout at Woodburn last night kept back the local and overland, the former remaining for two nights trip, the latter leaving Portland this morning and reaching Albany at about 1:30, the damage at Woodburn having been repaired. The Roseburg local arrived at about 2 o'clock on its way south, while the north bound came in at about 12:30 about an hour late. The Yaquina train met with an hour and a half delay at the track two miles this side of Toledo, and was delayed an hour. It left Albany on its return trip over an hour and a half late.

SIGNIFICANT.—Mr. Wallace Nash, of the Oregon Pacific while in the city today, in speaking with an Albany man about the train blockades said substantially "I suppose we will be having the same trouble at the Southern Pacific next winter when we get to running trains over the Cascades," a significant remark. There is little doubt that the O. P. will be pushed during 1892.

Mr. Blackman with Frank Good has bought the retail department of Blumauer & Frank, of Portland, and will, after a few weeks, remove his family to that place.

A FARM DIVIDED.—Mr. Jas. Roberts has sold about 300 acres off his big farm near Shedd to a new owner from the East, for \$17,500, and now has 500 remaining for his own use. The big farms of the county will gradually be cut up into smaller farms in this manner, and that is what the county needs.

A RELIC.—Bishop Morris has recently discovered a relic in the Coquille country that has a very singular and interesting history. It is an old, large folio Bible and Prayer book bound together, that was in use in Trinity Church, New York City, before the revolution. It was printed in London in 1728, and contains, besides the Bible and English prayer book, Sternhold and Hopkins' version of Psalms, with metrical versions of the Te Deum, Lord's Prayer and Ten Commandments. It has also a form of Family Prayer in which the words "So mote it be" take the place of the ordinary Amen. It is bound in thick oak boards, with heavy brass clasps, and bears many evidences of its age and hardships.
