

OBITUARY NOTICE

Died, at her residence in Linn county, Oregon, Dec. 22nd, at the age of 53 years, 6 months and 17 days, Louisa Parrish Houston. Our dear mother was born in Geary county, Ohio, June 5th, 1838, who with her parents, Evans and Catharine Parrish, emigrated to the state of Iowa in the year 1847, from which state they moved to Linn county, Oregon, in 1853, by the long and wearisome journey common in those days, across the plains. She was married to Newton Houston, who still survives here, June 15th, 1854. She was the mother of eleven children, eight living, who with her bereaved husband, one brother, W. W.
