

Governor Campbell, of Ohio, thinks neither Cleveland or Hill will be nominated for president on account of neither having the solid support of several important state delegations. He thinks Governor Patterson the strongest of eastern candidates but thinks a western man will be nominated—Palmer probably.

Mr. Clarkson must be badly frightened at the second defeat of his party in Iowa to talk as he did in Des Moines last week of another bloody-shirt campaign. There are no more presidents for the republican party in that issue. They will have to face the tariffs the sins of the billion dollar congress, and probably silver too in some form. And when Mr. Clarkson talks of "triumphing without Iowa if need be," he in effect admits the probability of defeat.

The Statesman treats with contempt and ridicule the suggestion made by the farmers alliance of Kansas that the governor of that state should call the legislature together for the purpose of electing a United States senator to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Plumb. It is a little odd that members of the farmers alliance in that state should waste breath. They should know that the republicans in the northwest will not comply with so just a demand. The legislature is farmers alliance, the governor is republican. This tells the whole tale, notwithstanding it affords the Statesman an opportunity to indulge in one of its characteristic sneers at the farmers alliance.

A so-called "reform" journal refuses to discuss the tariff question on the ground that such discussion would be unprofitable. It says that we have had little else for the last century than the discussion of that question, and yet the masses know less about it than they did in 1860. This is a strange statement to come from any one at all conversant with the history of the tariff question. Every intelligent man knows that the question has been more extensively and intelligently discussed during the last four years than in the period of the entire history of the country prior to 1884. It is further known that people know far more about the tariff question now than ever before. The man who is too chicken-hearted to investigate the monstrous evils of tariff protection must clear the way or be crushed beneath the juggernaut wheels of tariff agitation and discussion.

The DEMOCRAT takes this occasion to inform the *East Oregonian* that it is not on account of the spirit of "protection" that it expressed itself in favor of free coinage of silver to the extent of the American product. The DEMOCRAT would restrict it to the American product for several reasons. The first is because it is unwise to coin into legal tender money the bullion of Great Britain, Germany, Russia and other commercial nations that reject it themselves. If we should adopt unlimited coinage our country would be made the dumping ground of the rejected silver bullion of those countries and there would be great fears that it could not be floated at par so long as it is degraded by the countries named. It is only to protect the parity of gold and silver that the DEMOCRAT would limit the coinage to the American product. No, sir, no such "protection" for the DEMOCRAT. The DEMOCRAT believes in protection for the masses and opposes all "protection" for the classes. We trust our esteemed cotemporary understands us.

A dispatch from Columbus, Ohio, says: Great excitement has been caused among the democracy of Columbus over the attempt to start a Hill presidential boom at the dinner of the Jackson club on Jan. 8. Tonight a big meeting was held and strong resolutions were adopted.

The importance of the Jackson club banquet can be estimated when it is stated that for years its Jackson day banquets have been considered the annual love feast of the Ohio democracy, often participated in by guests of national distinction. The resolutions are appended.

Whereas, There have been widely published newspaper reports to the effect that Gov. D. B. Hill, of New York, has been invited to be the guest of honor at the Jackson club banquet on Jan. 8, 1891, and that said occasion was to be the inauguration of a Hill boom for the presidency of the United States; therefore be it

Resolved, That such publication is unauthorized by the club or by any committee of the same. We denounce the said publication as untrue and believe it to have been dictated by some person who, from selfish motives, desired to place this organization in the unfavorable light of espousing the cause of one candidate at the expense of others.

Resolved, That while the Jackson club takes no part in the choice of a candidate previous to a nomination, it believes in honoring democrats who do not seek in their tents and who support nominees of their conventions, especially when such issues are at stake as confronted the people in 1888, at which time Grover Cleveland was treacherously defeated for the presidency, or in 1891, when J. E. Campbell was defeated for governor by the direct and indirect aid of alleged democratic leaders.

These resolutions were unanimously adopted. An investigation showed that the Hill boom was started by two or three members of the club who expected to commit the organization to his interests and thus start the fight to capture the Ohio delegation.

Gov. Hill will receive an informal invitation to the banquet, but will not be asked to respond to a toast.

The Portland Daily *Dispatch* grows better day by day and when it speaks of the issues of the day the call is not an uncertain one. Tony's democracy is as sound as a dollar. The Portland Weekly *World* talks very nicely about C. W. Roby as the next democratic candidate for governor of Oregon. The *West Side* thinks it not strange that Senator Stanford and wife should embrace spiritualism after reading the senator's crazy scheme of government loans on land. The Washington *Independent* has a most excellent supplement. It is a sheet containing a picture of a variety of articles of personal attire and household implements with figures showing the rate of duty on each. Example: Flannel shirt 100, trousers 110, shoes 25, cotton towel 45, overcoat \$5, spool thread 60, sewing machine 45, blanket 111, etc. E. C. Phelps has sold his interest in the Hillsboro *Democrat* to his late partner G. A. Sandford.

Republican leaders in Ohio have perfected a scheme of gerrymandering the congressional districts in that state by which that party will secure 15 out of the 21 districts of the state, leaving the democrats 6. The DEMOCRAT declared the gerrymandering made by the democrats in that state two years ago little less than a crime. This move of the republicans, when consummated will be equally heinous. We trust that the *Oregonian* and other organs of that party will now raise their voice and denounce this outrage with the same vehemence that characterized their denunciation of the democratic outrage of two years ago, and particularly will the whole public expect President Harrison to send in a message to congress inviting the attention of that august body to this move with such choice words of virtuous indignation as were used in his late message concerning the Michigan gerrymander.
