TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

The Worlds Fair.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Representative Durborrow, of Illinois, chairman of the world's fair committee of the house, returned to Washington from Chicago today, and makes the announcement that congress will not be asked to loan \$5,000,000 to the exposition, but to appropriate that amount. Mr Durborrow said tonight that the \$10,000,000 contributed was sufficient for the original plans of the exposition, but these plans had been broadened in scope by the national commission, and he thought it only fair that the additional expense should be borne by the government. A bill providing for the appropriation and giving the government a proportionate share in the profits of the exposition is being prepared in Chicago.

The Egyptian Question.

PARIS, Jan. 7.—The death of the Khedive of Egypt has created an ominous sensation throughout France, and particularly in this city. It is believed that France will take this opportunity of reopening the whole Egyptian question, and that she will insist upon the appointment of a regency with a French representation in such regency. England, it is thought, will insist that Prince Abbas, the eldest son of the late Khedive, is old enough to reign, or should England not take that course, it is inferred that she will advocate the appointment of a council or regency with Sir Evelyn Baring, the British agent, consul general and minister plenipotentiary.

S. W. Matters.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The senate commerce committee held its first formal session this morning. The following bills were ordered favorably reported: Appropriating \$65,000 for a lighthouse at Cape Disappointment, Wash. To repeal certain sections of the revised statutes providing bonds for the registry of vessels. Providing for the construction of two United States revenue cutters for service on the Pacific coast. To establish life-saving stations at Rogue river and Port Orford, Oregon.

Southern Oregon Mines.

GRANT'S PASS, Or Jan 7.—The late rains have flushed the mountain streams and gulches to just a proper stage for prospecting, and this so far has been an ideal winter for the miners. A man who is largely interested in placer mining in Josephine county, estimates that there are now 250 miners in this county working in paying claims, and that the output of gold for the year will exceed that of any previous year for a decade.

Bill The Lion.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—David B. Hill is the lion of the democracy. He was sworn in as a senator today and he received an ovation from the democrats of the senate.

A Jail Break.

CORVALLIS, Or Jan 7.—Ed Scott, a young criminal, awaiting the action of the grand jury, broke jail last night and escaped. Two Indians, United States prisoners, in jail at the time, refused to accompany Scott.
