But few people know that there is such a thing assum-cuted tea in existence, and fewer have seen it. But there is, and it is of all teas the swoclest, purest, and most fragrant. You isk at once how it is that it is not offered for as a once how it is that it is not onered for water and that you know nothing of it. That is answered easily; but it is necessary to present first a few details. The public only knows two general classes, viz., the green and the black time. blath time

Green Teas.

Un-pleasant as the fast may be, it is nevertheless artificial: Pression Line, allica, gypsum, pluminaco, and other unbealthful mineral colors being used for this purpose. The effect is twofold. It not only manes the tea a bright, Is twent if it is easily inaccessive team bright, shiny, a tractive green, but also permits the use of "off-color" and workless tea, which, ouce under the green clock, are readily worked of as a good quality of tea. Thombor-linable coloring tractice oven admits of the use of foreign substances, and the English government, which looks closer into the gen-ulumess of its shulles the news. government, which looks clease into the gen-ulteness of its staples than ours, has in some of the alleged "finest" of test sound rodried leaves, straw, fragments of matting, rice-husks, and willow leaves. In fact, it is openly strated by an English authority that hundreds of thousands of pounds of sloe, ash, and wil-low leaves are annually imported as tes, which willout the coloring process would be impossible. They report ten is one of the most notoriously adulterated articles of commerce. The tomptation to make sweepings and bat tes into a merohantable product with a few the comparise to make sweepings and bail tes into a merohanizable product with a few cents' worth of green coloring matter is too strong to withstand, and the worthlraness of the trash that often finds its way to this mar-ket labeled "New Crop," "Dest Quality," "Green Tea," etc., would simply actoured the public if, revealed, to say nothing of the un-bathful test. healthfulness of the Prussian blue, plum-bago, gypsum, and the other mineral colors that are employed.

The basket and pan-fired Japan tess, as well as the China teas that may be included under the general heading of "black teas," get their the general heading of "black teas," got their color from the firing or tousting process, but minoral coloring matter is also frequently used to give a certain desired commercial appearance. The firing and the coloring, as in the green teas, largely conceals the iden-tity of the tea, and permits the use of the very cheapest teas, to argue nothing for the deteriorating effect of excessive firing (which must be resorted to when a very cheap prod-uet is used and an extreme color desired. Concerning sun-dried teas the people of the Pacific Coast have heard but little and know less, although it is extensively used where it is known and understood. We are told that when to a is so poor it cannot be sold at home or safely shipped to the English markets, it is shipped to America; that we will drink anyshipped to America: that we will drink any-thing. That may possibly be one of the rea-sons we have not been offered sun-dried teas. They were good enough to send elsewhere. The sun-dried teas being sun-cured, no coloring matter is used, hence nothing but pure tea leaves can be employed; for unas-stated by manipulation or coloring, all atsisted by manipulation or coloring, all at-tempts at adulteration or the introduction of foreign leaves or matorial would be bold and giaring. That it is, therefore, sweeter and far more fragrant than the artificially colored green teas and the manipulated bashet or pan-first trans, you hardly need he told. That it is more healthful than the mineral-colored tens, is also apparent. That it is more expen-sive, is also true; and that is another reason you have never seen it. There is not so much profit in it as there is in the cheap adulterstel and colored teas.

About the Cost of Teas.

According to the custom-house reports, the According to the custom home reports, the amount of tea received at San Francisco last spear (1850) was 0.500,107 pounds, and thevaine \$255,250, or a fraction over like per pound. The consumer, of which the reader was one, paid for that 120 tea all the way from 500 to \$1 per pound. In other words, for that \$956,250 worth of tea the consumer paid between four and for allower dollar. and five millions of dollars. There are your enormous profits, and there you will probably find the chief reason why must of you never heard of a sun-dried ten. As the sun-dried tens have no mask, they are compelled to be abso-late g pure and of better quality than the avdicially colored and manipulated teas. Hence the margins on them are smaller, and many dealers don't care about handling them, and you know nothing about them. But it is the object of this article to toll you where you about them.
