

CONSTITUTION.

The following is the constitution adopted by the democratic societies of Oregon in convention, assembled at Portland January 9th, 1892:

THE CONSTITUTION.

We, the democratic clubs, societies and leagues of Oregon, in convention assembled, associate ourselves together under the following constitution:

First—The name of this association shall be the Democratic Society of Oregon.

Second—The objects of this association are as follows:

To foster the formation of permanent democratic clubs, societies and leagues throughout the state of Oregon, and insure their active cooperation in disseminating Jeffersonian principles of government.

To preserve the constitution of the United States, autonomy of the states, local self-government and freedom of elections. To resist revolutionary changes and the centralization of power.

To oppose the imposition of taxes beyond the necessities of the government economically administered.

To promote economy in all branches of the public services.

To oppose unnecessary commercial restrictions for the benefit of the few at the expense of the many.

To oppose class legislation, which deplores labor and builds up monopoly.

To maintain inviolate the fundamental principles of the democracy, "Equality before the law; and

To co-operate with the co-ordinate organizations of the democratic party in support of democratic and democratic measures.

Third—All political clubs, societies and leagues in the state of Oregon, which concur in the objects of this association, are eligible to membership.

Fourth—The officers of this association shall consist of a president, vice-president at large, and also one vice-president from each county in the state; a secretary and treasurer who shall have the usual power of such officers, subject to the regulation of the executive committee, all such officers to be elected annually.

Fifth—The affairs of this association when not in convention assembled, shall be managed by an executive committee consisting of fifteen members, together with the officers of this association, all of whom shall be ex-officio members of the executive committee, which shall have power to designate sub-committees. Five members of the executive committee shall make a quorum.

Sixth—The officers of this association shall be elected at each regular convention, and there shall also at the same time and place be elected one vice president for the national association of democratic clubs, and four members of the general committee for said national association. All officers shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified, unless sooner removed by the committee.

Seventh—The executive committee may fill vacancies in their own body and in any of the offices of this association, and are also authorized to admit clubs, societies and leagues to membership, but a convention shall have power to overrule any action of this committee. The executive committee may also raise funds by voluntary subscriptions to carry out the purposes and objects of this association, and shall have all the powers of the association, unless by special resolution limiting the same. The treasury shall be custodian of all the funds, and shall disburse the same only on the order of the executive committee, signed by the secretary and countersigned by the president or vice-president at large.

Eighth—There shall also be organized in each county of this state an association of clubs, societies or leagues auxiliary to this association. There shall be organized in each voting precinct in the respective counties, a club society or league, auxiliary to the county association. The executive committee of this association shall recommend a uniform system of organization for the respective counties.

Ninth—The regular convention of this association shall be held at a place to be determined at each annual meeting. Notice of at least three weeks shall be given by the secretary to every member of this association.

Tenth—The executive committee may, by a two-thirds vote, call a special convention of this association, of which three weeks' notice shall be given.

Eleventh—In convention, the members of this association shall be entitled to representation as follows: Each club, society or league shall be entitled to five delegates, and one additional delegate for every fifteen members in good standing, but no club, society or league shall be entitled to more than twenty-five delegates.

Twelfth—At a convention of this association each delegate shall have one vote.

Thirteenth—This constitution may be amended at a convention upon a two-thirds vote.

A GLANCE AT THE EXCHANGES.

The Alliance Herald tells how Andrew Carnegie gave his employer a New Year's present and then cut down their wages for the coming year. The Yamhill County Ledger writes a long article rather against the idea of a future state of existence for the wicked. The Eugene Guard says the signs of the times point to Senator Hill as the coming democratic leader. The Mercury says "six months ago it was headed 'Hill as a Possibility.' Now it should read 'Hill as an Impossibility.'" The Democratic Times tells of the spirit of hate which always actuates the Oregonian towards the south. The Roseburg Review says it still holds to the good old idea that mortgages should be taxed. The Portland Telegram says that the oldest citizens concede that they have never seen the fires of democratic enthusiasm burning so brightly in Oregon as now. The Eugene Journal takes great pride in opposing the Australian ballot law. The Junction City Times has no use for a democrat who will not discriminate in favor of his party, that is party performance, and a republican who will not stick by his friends is worse than a mugwump.

PERSISTENT FALSIFYING.

The Oregonian says: Tammany sold out Hancock in 1880 and Cleveland in 1888 when it might have elected both. This is history.

So far as the above statement relates to trading off Mr. Cleveland in 1888, it is notoriously false and no one knows it better than Scott. But that paper makes this statement quite frequently. Let us look at the facts: In 1884 when Mr. Cleveland was elected, New York City, where Tammany has its only organization, gave him 43,064 majority. In 1888 when Mr. Cleveland was defeated, Tammany gave him 57,174 majority. Does that look much like Tammany sold him out? No, it is false to the knowledge of every one. In 1888 Cleveland was defeated in Brooklyn and the rural counties of that state. These are facts and history as well.

Mr. Springer, chairman of the ways and means committee, said in a speech at New York the other day:

"Of one thing the country may be assured, that no step backward in the cause of genuine tariff reform will be taken by the democratic members of the present house of representatives. Opposition to the objectionable features of the McKinley bill and a demand for tariff reform will be kept in view, and this issue will be put forward as paramount and overshadowing the others in the presidential campaign of 1892."

This does not look much like democrats would now go back on their tariff views. It will be the last the party will do.

A DISPATCH FROM COLUMBUS, INDIANA.

In eight of the twelve county conventions in this part of the state yesterday resolutions were adopted endorsing Isaac P. Gray as a presidential candidate for 1892 and ex-Congressman C. C. Matson for governor of Indiana. In Bartholomew, Prown, Scott and Jackson counties, Cleveland was preferred for president. In all counties there was a clamor for a tariff for 1892 similar to that of 1880. The democratic party will go into the next presidential canvass in excellent condition in Southern Indiana.

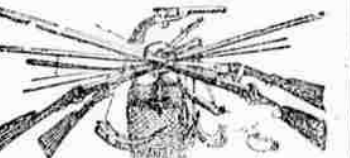
