

THE NEW LAW.—An exchange says: According to the new voting law the judges and clerks of election must be served with notice of their appointment within thirty days from the time the sheriff receives the notices from the clerk. The notice of election must also be posted within the same time. The sheriff is required to take charge of the voting booths the day before election and attend to placing them and care for them afterwards. To do this he will be compelled to have a deputy in each precinct.

ASTORIA TOO.—On Main street, between Third and Fourth, right in the middle of the street, is to be seen a newly made grave. On the head-board is inscribed: "Died in the Mud." In Memory of The City Paps.

Miss Susan Dorris, one of Eugene's accomplished young women, who has been in the photographic business several years, passed through Albany this morning for Tacoma, where having sold her interest in Winters gallery, she has accepted a position in Jackson's art gallery.

Hon Lark Bilyeu, of the State Board of Equalization, was in the city today on his way to Eugene. He reported a live time in the Equalizing business. The state tax levy will be made tomorrow forenoon, and will be made, undoubtedly, under the figures as equalized by this board, and provided for by the new law.

MISCHIEF AND WISANT.—The staunch little steamer Mischief sailed away Monday afternoon for Puget Sound where she will be transferred to the British flag. This vessel was built at Onatka, a few miles up the bay, in the year 1888, by George Walker. Her owners were Captain J J Winant, M L Buckley and Warren Brothers. For a time she did a lively business between coast points to the north and south of this place, but the trade becoming divided, soon became unprofitable. Captain Winant thinks a class of small, light draft whalebacks will soon supersede the more expensive, full rigged schooners of the present time, and hence purposes to meet the change. The Mischief will be missed from Newport front and we but express a common regret when we say this. Captain Winant will no doubt make an effort to obtain a whaleback suitable for this trade and in this endeavor we wish him every success. He brought the first steamer into this bay, the steamship Shubrick, light-house tender. Later he piloted the steamer Coquille, she being the first freight steamer to enter this bay. He also brought over the bar the steamer Yaquina City, the pioneer steamer of the O. D. company, and he was master of the tug Favorite and did all the initial towing for the Oregon Pacific R'y company.—Times.

MEMORIAL DAY.—By the passage of a resolution by the supreme lodge of the A O U W Jan 18th is made the legal Memorial day of that order. It commemorates the date of the death of J J Upchurch, the founder of the order. Pursuant to a proclamation of Supreme Master Workman J W Kinsley, the members of Safety lodge of this city will celebrate that day by a public meeting at the opera house in this city. A program of exercises will be given to the public in a few days.
