The Tin-Plate Consumers' Association,
numbering 256 of the canning firms of the

An ancient roadway has been discovered

and gravel. Each slab is about 12 feet

vent of the Indians.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Will Be War With Chili.

WASHINGTON, Jan 13.—Representative
O'Neill, of Missouri, is reported to have
said today: "You may say that there will
be war; don't put any ifs or ons to it; make
the statement broad and unqualified."
A prominent officer of the army who re-
ceived a letter from one of the naval forces
Valparaiso yesterday said: "In six weeks a
detachment of the army will be moving on
Chili, I thoroughly believe what I say."
One ominous sign is the great inactivity
of congress in the matter.

No Politics in Eating.

WASHINGTON, Jan 14.—Some of the re-
publican papers have been criticizing Sen-
ator Dolph because he gave a dinner to Sen-
ators for the purpose of meeting Dave Hill.
The Oregon senator says that when he gets
so he cannot eat with a democrat he will
have public life, and as the dinner was
given for old friendship sake, he feels the
criticisms to be entirely out of place. The

Four Hundred Drowned

LONDON, Jan 13.—A dispatch from Hong
Kong says the steamer Nanchow has
foundered off Coochin point. Her shaft
broke and the water entered the hold, caus-
ing the steamer to sink soon after. She
had on board a very large number of Chi-
nese passengers, and sank so rapidly that it
was impossible to launch her boats. When
she went down she carried with her 414
persons, every one of whom was drowned.
The steamer was officered and manned by
Europeans. They stood to their posts to the
last, and did every thing possible to save
their vessel. All of them went down with
the steamer.

A New Way

CHESTER, Wash Jan 13.—Tom Rice,
Packard and Mason, three prisoners confined
in the county jail, made an escape in broad
daylight this morning. With a hot flat-
iron they burned a hole through the floor
and burrowed underneath. Rice was cap-
tured by the sheriff, after a hard run
near Centralia this afternoon.

A Cardinal Dead

LONDON, Jan 13.—Cardinal Manning
died at 8:20 this morning. Cardinal Henry
Edward Manning was born at Tottenham,
Hertfordshire, England, July 15, 1808. He
became one of the most prominent of Roman
Catholics.

Heavy Rains in Alabama

MONTGOMERY, Ala Jan 13.—It has been
raining almost continually throughout the
state since Friday night. The Alabama
river is thirty feet above low water mark,
and is rising one foot an hour. The gas
works are flooded, and are furnishing no
light. All the roads in this part of the
state are suffering from washouts, and have
suspended trains.
