PERFECT PUBLICATION.

Good O. P. NEWS.—The Oregon Pacific management will be reorganized on the 20th, by the sale of the road to the bondholders, and immediate action will be taken for its construction eastward. This has already been told our readers, but it is so satisfactory that it will not repeat itself six times a week for it means much for this part of Oregon. The Oregonian says: "Arrangements for buying in the entire property of the Oregon Pacific railroad at the sale on the 20th inst. on behalf of the bondholders, and said to be satisfactory to all these, are now complete. Colonel Hogg, president of the road and at present receiver, has left New York for Oregon to be present at the sale and to carry out these arrangements. A high official of the road declares that all the bondholders are now co-operating harmoniously for the reorganization of the company, and for the carrying out of these plans which will insure the early completion of the road to its eastern terminus, and also the provision of the necessary steamship accommodations to expedite and satisfactorily handle the traffic of the completed road."

ORANGE GARDENS.—Oregon has six months of sunshiny weather unsurpassed anywhere, and even in the winter we do not have a rain by a big majority, though we are glad to report, we have considerable. Last year according to a record kept by a Democrat man, it rained on only thirteen Sabbaths, snowed on one, and elected on one or two. The Democrat is glad to publish both favorable and unfavorable comment on Oregon, and gives a case of the latter in order to show up one of the biggest liars in the U. S. Hugh Glasgow writing from Salem to the Salt Lake Tribune, said, among other things:

"Well, you see by this I am out in Oregon, and it does not rain again; it rains always; it is the same old shower; it started eleven weeks ago and it still rains. I came here thinking to better myself and get into a green country. Well, the country is green enough, so green that the moss is from one to four inches thick on the roofs of all the old houses, and if I stay here much longer I will be green enough to have it on my back, and then I shall be a moss-back. I am almost web-footed now, but I am never lonesome on the street, for I always have a steady companion, my dear numbers; we are one and inseparable. Well, I almost forgot to tell you how it rains here, but then we do not mind it much; we get used to it. Why, men work in it all the time; it just drizzles a little, will soon get used to it, is the way they talk out in this land of water, but I don't think I could ever get used to it. I get the blues, never or hardly ever seeing the sun."

HAD SEEN TOO MUCH HUMBUG.—On December 23d, Rev. Elbridge Gerry, died at his home near West Randolph, Vt., at the age of 54 years. He was pastor of the Congregational church in Oregon City from 1868 to 1872 and from 1882 to 1883. Being a printer, he spent his spare time while there at the Enterprise office in setting type. At the time of his death he was editor of the West Randolph Herald and News. In a letter written while before his death he said: "Some people in the parishes where I have labored have treated me more kindly than I deserved; of others I have nothing to say. I am still a Congregationalist, believe in John Calvin, Prof. Park and no probation hereafter. I expect to meet some of my old friends hereafter, others I do not, and some I do not care to. As a newspaper man I have come in contact with so much humbug, that I grow into Carlyle's views of humanity."

It having been ascertained that County Organizer Shelton was unable to discharge the duties of said office, he was requested to surrender his credentials in favor of J. M. Morris. John Bryant and — Denton were elected delegates to the State Alliance after having declared themselves in favor of the people's party. By a vote of the body it was decided to hold an open meeting in Brownsville on the first Friday in February. The next County Alliance will be held in Lebanon the first Friday in March. By a large majority vote, the County Alliance again expressed itself in favor of independent political action.
