TELEGRAPHIC NEWS
A Terrible Explosion.
CATLETTSBURG, Ky Jan 18.—A powder
mill at Central City exploded this morning
with terrific force. The sound was heard at
fronton, twenty-five miles away. Window
glass was broken in Catlettsburg. This is
the third explosion at the Phoenix mill in
three months, and the most destructive.
The cause will never be known, as all the
workmen in the mill were killed. It has
been ascertained that the first explosion was
in the glazing mill, where there were ten
tons of powder. Successively the packing
house, magazine, four wheel mills, and a
car loaded with gunpowder went hurling in
flaming fragments through the air. Not a
vestige of the entire place remains.
A Double Lynching.
FORT SMITH, Ark Jan 18.—Deputy
United States Marshal Leggett has just
come in from the northern part of the state,
where he was chasing moonshiners. He
reports a double lynching, which occurred
in the mountains. Peter Baker, a farmer,
was found murdered in his home. His
wife and a man named Johnson left the
country, but both returned a few days ago.
The neighbors suspected them of putting
Baker out of two ways. The couple were
captured, lashed together back to back and
then hanged by the same rope until dead.
Seeking Safety.
WASHINGTON, Jan 18.—Senator Dolph
has received a telegram from the Hon. L. M.
Olmstead, of Baker City, Or., asking the
senator to obtain for him, in case of a war,
permission to raise a regiment of cavalry,
as this section contained the best material
in the world for that arm of the service.
Senator Dolph referred the letter to the sec-
retary of war, saying that Judge Olmstead
was a veteran of the war of the rebellion,
and amply able to carry out what he pro-
posed.

BROWNSVILLE, Jan 18, 1892.

was guilty of a crime that had been a
man he would necessarily have to go to
the hotel De Downing. At that time his
relatives took up a collection, as they
then stated, to take said boy to the re-

ran away and is now in Brownsville.

WASHINGTON, Jan 18.—Secretary Blaine
in the course of a conversation conducted
with a friend today left it to be inferred
that the probability of an amicable
settlement of the difficulty with Chili was
mighty improbable; in fact, he briefly
hinted as much when asked how the latest
phase of the quarrel, the gross insult to
Commander Evans, of the Yorktown, had
affected the situation. In Washington the
feeling of impending war is rapidly assum-
ing the aspect of a certainty.
A Bloody Tree.
MOBILE, Ala Jan 18.—Harry Hinton
who was implicated by Bob Sims, as a mem-
ber of his gang, and captured two weeks
ago, was taken from jail and hanged to the
tree upon which the other members met
their death. Neal Sims, the only male
member of the family now alive, was sur-
rounded by a posse in a swamp last night,
but escaped.
