TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Four Fatal Accidents.

SPRING VALLEY, Minn. Jan. 19.—A most peculiar and frightful quadruple accident occurred near this city Sunday. Frank Osterlander, a farmer, had the misfortune to cut his leg while chopping wood. He was helped by friends to his home and bed. This evening his wife, in a delicate condition, went out to milk the cows, and was killed nearly to death by one of the brutes. She managed to crawl to the house, where, without a helping hand, she gave birth to twins. Shortly afterwards the twins died. The burden of grief and pain was too much for the mother, and she died an hour later. The father in a frenzy of grief endeavored to rise from his bed and started the injured leg bleeding. Before he could reach the side of his dead wife and babes he bled to death.

Will There be War?

WASHINGTON Jan. 19.—There was a hull in talk today, with reference to the Chilean matter, on the house side of the capitol. The disposition was to await the receipt of the president's message before endeavoring to form a decided opinion on the subject. The feeling expressed was nearly all of disbelief in war as the probable outcome of the trouble. A number of democratic representatives who were talked with deprecated a war with so small a nation as Chile, and said the United States is large and strong enough to overlook a great many things rather than to proceed to extremities.

A Bad Brother-in-Law.

SPRINGFIELD, Wash. Jan. 19.—A week ago Sunday night the grocery store of A. L. Reitz was burglarized and a pocket-book containing \$75 stolen. The thief was supposed to be well acquainted with the place. A reward of \$100 was offered. Officers kept a sharp watch and today arrested George Smith, the brother-in-law of Reitz. After Marshal Edmundson made the arrest \$500 of the stolen money was recovered from Smith. He is still in jail.

The Coldest Yet.

ST. PAUL, Jan. 19.—Reports are of the coldest night, with one exception, since four years ago, when the thermometer reached 41 below. The mercury registered 26 below at 7 o'clock this morning. At Minneapolis, Minn., the minimum last night was 44 below. At Pierre, S. D., it was 24 below. At Huron, 34; at Moorhead, 38; at Duluth 30. The warm wave is rapidly approaching from the northwest.

A Fatal Street Car Accident.

SEATTLE, Wash. Jan. 19.—W. H. Schell, a conductor on the Madison-street cable road was killed about 6 o'clock this morning by the collision of a runaway car with the car on which he was riding.
