TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

They Protest Against War.
CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—Frances Willard received a telegram today from Massachusetts asking if she could not collect by telegraph the petitions of several hundred thousand women against a war with Chili and send it to Washington this week. Already the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union convention had formulated a protest and Miss Willard at once telegraphed for its presentation to President Harrison. It holds a number of other female organizations of the country who have been urged by telegraph to join the "protest of American womanhood against this needless war proposed to be waged by 63,000,000 people against 2,000,000."

Two Public Buildings.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The biggest fight the democrats have made on any public building bill occurred today that introduced by Senator Mitchell, and which passed the senate today, for a building at The Dalles. Both Senators, Mitchell and Dolph made speeches on the subject and urged the necessity for a building at The Dalles. It was necessary to have a roll call. There were twelve democrats who voted against the passage of the bill, while thirty-five republicans voted for it. Senator Dolph's bill for the building at Salem passed the senate with but very little opposition.

Ed Pentland Robbed.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—The sneak thief continues to get in his work around the city wherever he finds door-latches open and houses insecurely barred. The residence of E. C. Pentland, near the corner of Thirteenth and E streets, was entered by burglars at an early hour yesterday morning, and an overcoat and a silk umbrella were stolen from the hall. Mr. Pentland forgot to securely close the night latch.

The Indians There

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Agent Crawford was at the capitol today with a delegation of Umatilla Indians, which he had brought here for the purpose of securing some concessions from the Indian bureau. They wanted a hearing before the Oregon delegation, but all the members were too busy to accord them the time. They also wanted to see the president, and probably Senator Dolph will take them to the White house Friday.

A Runaway Accident

ROSEBURG, Or. Jan. 20.—As Mrs. Harman Conn was driving across a railroad track in a buggy today the horse became unmanageable and ran away, throwing her violently from the buggy and breaking both arms just below the elbow. She also sustained other serious injuries about the head and face.
