Whatever the politicians may wish, the plebiscite, as the New York World has frankly admitted, is overwhelmingly for Mr Cleveland.

The Iowa democrats have agreed that unless there shall be harmony in New York Gov. Hoese's name will be presented for the democratic presidential nomination.

He was killed with his fireman, and three passengers hurt.

The New York World has polled the New Jersey legislature on presidential preferences and here is what it says:

The result of the World's canvass of the New Jersey legislature for the presidential preferences of the members will be a surprise to many on the democratic side at least. It has been thought by politicians that Governor Hill was the favorite of the democrats in "Jersey," but the poll shows that Mr Cleveland leads all the others as decidedly as Senator Hill led in the canvass of the legislature at Albany.

Cleveland is popular with the masses, a great leader and a great statesman.

John Sherman in an interview said: "I am much gratified at my re-election. No other man has been given six terms in the senate from Ohio, and I don't think any man will be so greatly honored again. If I live to complete the term for which I was elected yesterday, I will retire from public life."

Speaking of the presidential outlook, Senator Sherman said he did not think Blaine should accept the republican nomination on account of his poor health, but that all the indications pointed to a tender of it to him.

The senator added that Harrison had made so many enemies in Ohio that he would have had work to carry the state if renominated.

ONLY ONE MAN.

Just at present the name of Hill is ground out as a possible candidate for the democratic nomination. Occasionally that of Gorman is heard, and the Chicago papers affect to keep the name of Palmer prominent as recently they did that of Springer for another place. Why Hill should be the candidate of any party for the presidential nomination is past finding out. The political idiosyncrasies of the New York Sun, and the waywardness of New York city politics, are phenomena that for small results in the case of the Sun, though often important ones in the other case, make them both serve not only as indicators but as warnings. If the history of presidential candidatures, and of presidential nominating conventions form a basis for estimating the result of the scheming that is at the present time reported as in operation, it is safe to conclude that the men whose names are most prominent, underestimate the force of public opinion. In the republican nominee we take little interest. Both Blaine and Harrison have weak and strong points which are for their party to choose between. If the democratic party make no vital mistakes, it will get the control of government affairs. The present indication seem to us to be that no serious mistakes will be made. The best men, such as Carlisle, Breckinridge, Vilas, Russell, Boies and others, too numerous to mention, understand that the new recruits for tariff reform are not to be led by a scheme that has for its only object the federal offices, and that the masses of the democracy demand good government at the hands of those to whom they are to give their confidence.

The democratic party has one tried man in whom the public have confidence; one who has had four years of valuable experience; one who will come into the office stronger and better fitted to take the helm than when he was first elected; one who knows better than he then knew the public men in whom to confide for advice. The Boston Herald, in discussing the qualifications of this man, said he possessed no fact. There may be some truth in this statement. Fact is not a material quali-

fication. But no one denies to him the courage of his convictions nor his willingness to stand or fall by what he deems the right or the expedient. He may make mistakes; he made them in his first term. But they were no more than mistakes. Which of the presidents has not made them? The modest and industrious course pursued by this man since his term expired has commended him to the favorable consideration of vast numbers of people who will vote for no other democrat.

To those who are seeking the payment of bounties by the government; to those who propose to pension everybody, their wives and their children; to those who desire the affairs of government administered only on a policy of extravagant expenditure and consequently excessive taxation, on a system of partial reciprocity such as is represented by McKinleyism; to those and to all such he is diametrically opposed.

Besides all this, the man of whom we speak is committed to a tariff policy of reduced taxation, one that commends itself to the vast body of the consumers and producers of commodities throughout the land. There is no safety in adopting any other party issue and no safety in selecting any other name than the one here advertised to head the ticket. One and only one man is called for by the great body of the people, by the great majority, as we believe, who are hoping and longing for a change of administration, and that man is Grover Cleveland.—Milwaukee Journal.

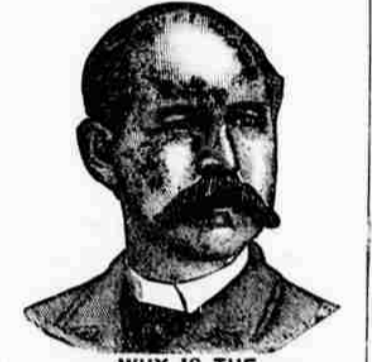
