MONEY STOLEN.—Mr H S Schwatka, time keeper for Bays & Jeffrey, the sewer contractors, has been boarding at the City Restaurant for two and a half or three months. On Wednesday morning when he came down from his room he took his watch from under his pillow, but left his purse containing \$85 in money under his pillow. He says his habit has been to take them both out when he leaves his room, but that he did not do so on the morning in question. He went to his room at noon and also just after dinner. When he came in from work to supper, he asked Mrs Brannin if she had made his bed, when she replied that her husband had. He made it between 4 and 5 o'clock. He asked Brannin if he had found his purse. Brannin said he had not. They then both went up and searched for it, but it could not be found. Mr Brannin says he thinks Schwatka is mistaken about leaving his money there, as no one has a key to the room but himself and Schwatka, and that no one could enter except by a false key or going on top of the Joseph building and entering by a window. This is the statement of facts as made by Mr Brannin to a Democrat reporter.

YANQUIN ALL RIGHT.—The people of the bay country are looking forward to a prosperous year in 1902. Confidence in Yaquina property is being restored on a much firmer basis than ever before, and during the last few weeks considerable property has changed hands. Captain Robertson, who is stopping for a few days in Corvallis, sold 100 lots in Robertson's addition to Yaquina, the first of this week. He has faith in the bay country, and thinks those who have property there are sure to come out on top. He says the work on the north jetty has been of great benefit to Yaquina harbor. This winter has proven without a doubt that Yaquina is the safest harbor on the Oregon coast. The steamer Willamette Valley came in last week without difficulty at extreme low tide, drawing 14 feet of water; this means at least 25 feet of water at high tide. Six years ago 16 feet of water at high tide was considered good for the bay.—Corvallis Gazette.
